Make the Sign of the Cross.

Someone says: "Peace be to this house and: to all who dwell here, in the name of the Lord.

Respond: Blessed be God forever.

Reader: In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things come to be through him, and without him nothing came to be..... And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we saw his glory, the glory as of the Father's only Son, full of grace and truth. (John 1:1-3.14)

Respond: Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. May we be blessed with health, goodness of heart, gentleness and the keeping of your law. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our love for each other may go out to all. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Proceed throughout your home blessing rooms by sprinkling Holy Water in each room and asking God to bless the family life that happens there.

# *Pastor's Corner*

## **Solemnity of the Epiphany**

Star-light, star-bright the first star I see tonight, I wish I may-- I wish I might-- I wish upon this star tonight. Do you remember every trying to tap into the wonder and mystery of a wish made upon a star? That mysterious light so far way--lifts us beyond the restrictions and limits of this world to contemplate with wonder and awe God's creative plan for our world and for all eternity. Stars have a way of reassuring us that in the midst of darkness and the challenges of life the hand of God is with us holding all things together.

In the ancient world, a new star in the sky was a sign that an important person, a king had been born. It was no wonder that Herod and all of Jerusalem were upset when the Magi, traditionally known as the three Wise Men, came looking for a new born king. They were foreigners, strangers searching for a new King outside of Jerusalem. This was a threat to Herod who represented the old order that fought to stay in power.

The searching journey of the Magi speaks of the desire in our hearts for something more in life... the yearning we have for new ways of seeing, for a greater sense of hope, and for a wisdom that leads to deep peace. The gift the Magi bring to us is their courage and commitment to step out in faith, being attentive to creation and the wisdom of the ages. They listened deeply with the head and heart probing the curious ways of God's providence.

In their quest it is clear that they expected to find a king! Why else would they have brought their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? They trusted their intuition and the signs that God had given to them and they were blessed to pay homage to the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. The chief priests and scribes should have known the signs from their study of scripture and history, but they sat in darkness--symbols of the old order that felt they knew God. Ask yourself, when you come to Mass do you expect to find Jesus, the King?

The feast of the Epiphany reminds us that there is so much more to life than what meets the eye. When I look back over my life, I never cease to be amazed by the many people, experiences and guiding lights that God has put into my life—just at the right place and at the right time. We never know what surprises God intends for us. Even in darkness he provides a guiding light. That is why we must nurture the seeking heart of the Magi.

For the Magi, it was not just any baby they found—it was the Son of God. When we gather for Mass it is important to remember that this is not just a nice communal gathering of like-minded people sharing stories and eating wafers...No, what we encounter here is the real presence of God! Ask yourself: "Do I bow in homage before the one who has won for us the price of our salvation?"

If we truly believe this then, like the Magi, how can we go home the same way we came?" We can't help but be changed. Maybe this means confronting the way I treat others. Maybe this means working toward a better balance in my life. Maybe this means less worry and more trust. Jesus is born for us "to be hope for our hearts, to be peace for our souls, to be love that renews, to be light for our eyes." O come, let us adore Him, Christ the Lord! Fr. Angelo
