

Pastor's Corner



The Epiphany of the Lord January 6, 2013

Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem!
Your light has come, the glory of the Lord
shines upon you.
— *Isaiah 60:1*

This year the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord lands on the traditional day of the Feast, January 6th. The Founder of the Missionaries of the Precious Blood was born on this day in 1786 and was given the name Gaspar, Melchior, Balthazar del Bufalo, the traditional names of the three wise men. He was chosen by God to be the great apostle of the Precious Blood of Christ, focusing our attention upon the reconciling love of God.

The word “Epiphany” means manifestation, revelation or shining forth. Today’s feast celebrates the coming of Christ, the true Light of the world. The bright star that guided the magi to the place where the child was born paled in comparison to Jesus who is God from God and Light from Light. The words of the prophet Isaiah ring with clearer meaning *“Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you.”* (Is 60:1)

The Light of Christ has caught our attention and has brought us together today to adore and offer homage to our God. The searching journey of the magi speaks of the desire in our hearts for something more in life, the yearning we have for new ways of seeing, for a greater sense of hope, for wisdom that leads to deep peace.

It is clear that the magi expected to find a king. Why else would they have brought their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh? These foreigners trusted their intuition; they listen to what creation was telling them and they listened to their hearts. The Scribes and Pharisees, those who should have known the scriptures and prophecies of old, rejected the Light and remained in darkness. They had locked God up in the Temple and Synagogue. They missed the Messiah who was born among the poor and lowly. He came as one like us to show us the way.

The Feast of the Epiphany reminds us that there is so much more to life than what meets the eye. When I look back over my life, I never cease to be amazed by the many people, experiences and guiding lights that God has put into my life—just at the right place and at the right time. We never know what surprises God intends for us. Even in darkness He provides a guiding light. That is why we must nurture the seeking heart of the magi.

Today, do I expect to find Jesus, the King? What gift have I brought with me as I journey? Do I see the gift of myself as a treasure to present to the Christ Child?
