Easter as a Season

Most people think of Easter as a single day. But for Catholics, Easter isn't just one day. The Easter Season is 50 days, ending on the feast of Pentecost, this year May 19th. All too often the joy of Easter fades faster than the lilies that decorate the church. How can we keep the joy of Easter going throughout the year? The secret may lie in three of the virtues of our Catholic tradition: faith, hope and love.

Faith: Every Sunday is a "little Easter" as we celebrate the resurrection of Our Lord.

Hope: Increase hope as a family throughout the year.

Love: Love more deeply. Put on an attitude of charity to all people in all circumstances.

Pastor's Corner

Do you recall the Works of Mercy?

Corporal Works of Mercy: feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, shelter the homeless, comfort the prisoners, visit the sick and bury the dead.

Spiritual Works of Mercy: teach the ignorant, pray for the living & dead, correct sinners, counsel those in doubt, console the sorrowful, bear wrongs patiently and forgive wrongs willingly.

The Second Sunday of Easter is also known as Divine Mercy Sunday. Between 1930 and 1938 Christ appeared to Sr. Maria Faustina Kowalska, a Polish Sister of Mercy. In her diary she records fourteen revelations in which the Lord asks that a special feast of mercy be celebrated at the close of the octave of Easter. On April 30, 2000, Pope John Paul II canonized St. Faustina and made the proclamation establishing this special feast as part of the liturgical calendar.

The feast of Divine Mercy recalls an ancient liturgical tradition, reflected in a teaching attributed to St. Augustine about the Easter Octave; eight days he called “the days of mercy and pardon,” and the Octave Day itself “the compendium of the days of mercy”. This feast points to the merciful love of God that lies behind the whole Paschal Mystery—the whole mystery of the death, burial and resurrection of Christ—made present for us in the Eucharist.

The image of Divine Mercy is that of the Risen Lord standing with two rays of light shining from His heart and illuminating the world. These two rays of light represent blood and water. The blood recalls the sacrifice of the cross and the gift of the Eucharist, the water, in Johannine symbolism, represents not only Baptism but also the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus has taught us that we are not only to receive the mercy of God, but to use it by being merciful to others through our actions, our words, and our prayers. Blessed John Paul II once wrote: “The Church lives an authentic life when she professes and proclaims mercy—the most stupendous attribute of the Creator and of the Redeemer—and when she brings people close to the sources of the Savior’s mercy, of which she is the trustee and dispenser.” We are able to be instruments of mercy when we recognize that God has forgiven us and shares with us his peace, his reconciling love.

One day, an old lady offered her thoughts on a heated issue in her village and someone threw a potato which hit her. The old woman picked up the potato and put it in the pocket of her coat and went home. A few months later, during a parish dinner, when it was the custom of the parish to bring some of the fruits of their labors to church, the old woman arrived carrying a bag of potatoes. When asked about the bag of potatoes, she explained that she had taken the potato that had been thrown at her, cut it up and planted it. Now she was bringing the increase that had grown out of her forgiveness. Today, as we give thanks to the Risen Lord for His mercy and love, may we in turn be instruments of mercy for others.
