Pastor's Corner

One of the things that I have come to understand in life is that how we say goodbye is more important than how we say hello. How we say goodbye is important because it reflects the sacred gift of a relationship that has been fostered over time and honors the sharing of hearts. Most people struggle with goodbyes and would rather just fade away into the sunset. There is finality in a farewell which causes anxiety as we close one chapter in life and prepare to begin another chapter. We often try to ease the uncertainty by making a promise to visit or to call often or agreeing to spend the holidays together.

In this week's gospel Jesus is sharing his farewell address with His disciples at the Last Supper. He is going away and will no longer be able to be with them in the same way. Jesus reassures the disciples by telling them that He is going to prepare a place for them and that He will come back and take them to Himself. There is a life and energy that comes from healthy relationships and we do not want to lose that gift of love from another person when they are gone.

One of the ways that Jesus promises to be with us is through "the Advocate, the Holy Spirit whom the Father will send in my name." (John 14:26) This was a new reality for the disciples. An *advocate* is one who speaks in support of another person in need. Just as Jesus was present to walk with the disciples, so too, the Holy Spirit helps us in our need to remain faithful in the midst of change and uncertainty. Jesus doesn't simply want the disciples to remember him, He wants them to continue to feel and experience His living presence. Memories fade, but ongoing encounters with God will keep the faithful strong.

Jesus also offers the disciples the gift of His peace, a peace that is the fruit of His relationship with the Father. Each time we gather for Mass we offer each other the sign of peace. This gift of peace we offer and receive from one another is not simply a greeting wishing someone a good day. No, the peace we are talking about is the peace of Christ which is calm, sure and full of trust even the midst of the storms of life.

It's the kind of peace that is portrayed powerfully in the recent movie entitled "42" about the life of Jackie Robinson, the first African American Major League Baseball player. In the midst of terrible racist attacks and acts of discrimination Robinson maintained a peace which showed his true character and his firm conviction that he belonged to God. In order to give witness to the Light he had to confront the darkness of hate and prejudice not exchanging violence for violence but holding fast to goodness and integrity in the midst of violence. The gift of peace he tapped into was the presence of the Holy Spirit at work in Robinson's life. It is the peace of Christ that we must bring into our families, places of work or study, neighborhoods and cities.

This peace is not something we can stir-up ourselves; it is a gift given to us by the Risen Christ through the Holy Spirit. His presence is available to us so powerfully in His living word, His Body and Blood and in the gathered community as we share the sign of peace that points to the powerful gift of the peace of Christ.
