Trinity Sunday

Every once in a while it is good to hold and ponder a mystery of life....to stand in awe of some mystery and to recognize that we are a part of a much greater story. This offers hope because we recognize that God is the giver of all life and that God is ultimately bringing all things to the good. Who is this God we celebrate, worship, love, listen to, desire to be with and try to be like?

Scripture reminds us that there is no life apart from God. Though scripture never uses the title Trinity, God is revealed to us in a trinity of persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In pondering the mystery of God and the life that God has given to us, we come to see that God abundantly pours out His love for us each day and that this love is meant to be shared.

One of the earliest and most challenging lessons that children need to learn is how to share. We begin life believing the world belongs to us. When children are challenged to share what is theirs a tug of war often immerses and soon everyone is in tears.

Learning to share is an essential component of our faith because we are not placed upon the earth to simply take care of ourselves. People of faith recognize that we have a responsibility to help one another as good stewards of the gifts that God has given to us.


The call to share is beautifully revealed in this weekend's Feast of the Holy Trinity. The relationship of Father, Son and Holy Spirit reflects for us the unity in community that we are all called to share. This is not easy for us to put into practice. To help us grow in unity we are given families and communities which can be seen as schools of charity. Fr. Ronald Rolheiser observes that living and sharing within families and communities is not simply a question of developing patience, forgiveness and understanding in relation to other people's faults. The more important life lesson that comes from sharing is that we see that we are not the center of the world and in reality we come to see how selfish and immature we often are.

"Living in any community—marriage, family, religious community or genuine friendship helps us to become more aware of our faults and narrowness." In this setting we are challenged to knock off the rough edges of self-centeredness so as to be available for the needs of others.

God is a trinity of persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. God is a family, a community of persons sharing life together in such a way that what flows forth from this life is joy, peace and gratitude, the energy for life. To understand Trinity, simply sit down at table with family and friends, let the food, wine and conversation flow, and simply experience the Trinity. As someone once said: "alienation and aloneness are hell: shared life is heaven."
