Does the scene of the disciples being sent out two by two bring to mind any other scripture? After the flood, Noah opens the door of the ark and sends



his passengers out to renew the face of the earth. Certainly, Jesus has the same purpose. The purpose is fulfilled in your communion in the Body of Christ today, and in your being sent from the Eucharist into the world. The sending is so important that our word "Mass" derives from it. In Latin, the last words of worship are Ite, missa est, which means "Go, you are sent." From that, people began to call Catholic worship the missa, or in English, the "Mass." Our English words dismissal, missal, emissary, and mission are all related. We are not sent into the workaday world alone, but in relationship to one another. Some people have acquired the unhappy habit of leaving worship as soon as they receive Communion and therefore miss the prayer, the dismissal, and the solemn blessing that are essential parts of the Mass. Pastor's Corner

One of the challenges we face today is summed up in the thinking of C.S. Lewis in which he noted that we live in a society that has replaced "I believe," with "I feel." Lewis observed that we live in a society where personal values have replaced objective morality. Maybe you have heard it said: "I have my truth and you have your truth and that's all that matters." Yet, Truth is not what you and I say it is. No, we believe there is one Truth, namely Jesus Christ. It takes humility to realize that there is a higher authority that keeps us from rationalizing everything away. This is one of the dangers we live with in society today. There is an underlying attitude which says nothing has meaning unless I give it meaning.

The Prophet Amos we heard about in our First Reading today was called upon by God to speak a challenging message. "Hate evil, seek good and let justice prevail at the gate." (Amos 5:15) In speaking of the gate, Amos is saying that justice must not just be in the home or within the walls of the city, but at the gate which represents the entrance into the world. Amos makes it clear that unless a community of faith stands for righteousness and justice, then all the ritual celebrations done in its honor are empty and useless. Do we strive to seek good and not evil; to hate evil and to love good or do we prefer our own comfort and security by saying we do not want to get involved.

Basic to our way of living in this country is the right to religious liberty. For us our actions and intentions are formed by our belief in Jesus Christ. More and more there are efforts growing in our culture that are seeking to construct a more secularized type of religious system and because of this it has become more challenging to be engaged in the work of Jesus outside of a church building. And yet, that is precisely where we as Catholics have always been. The gospels show us that most of the work of Jesus was done outside the Temple or Synagogue. In imitation of Jesus the church stands with the poor, the homeless, the illiterate, the marginalized and the outcasts. The church as set up hospitals, schools, orphanages, outreach centers and other ministries to respond to crying needs. And as citizens of this country we have a right to practice our beliefs and to have our beliefs respected in these institutional settings.

It's important to note that we are involved in these ministries not just to help other Catholics but because we are "Catholic." As Catholics we have a responsibility to see Jesus in everyone we meet and the gospel motivates us to reach out in love to all who are in need.

Sometimes national and international issues are so large that we may choose to back away and not get involved thinking it won't do any good. When I have those feelings I think of this story of the sparrow and wild dove.

"Tell me the weight of a snowflake, a sparrow asked the wild dove. "Nothing more than nothing," was the answer. "In that case I must tell you a marvelous story." The sparrow said: "I sat on the branch of a fir tree, close to its trunk, when it began to snow, not heavily, not in a raging blizzard, no, just like in a dream, without any violence. Since I didn't have anything better to do, I counted the snowflakes settling on the twigs and needles of my branch. Their number was exactly 3,741,952. When the next snowflake dropped onto the branch—nothing next to nothing as you say—the branch broke off." Having said that, the sparrow flew away.

Maybe there is just one more voice needed to change the tide in favor of religious liberty. Maybe that voice is you or me.
