## *Pastor's Corner*

Last week we heard the Gospel of the farmer who went out sowing seeds. Some seed fell on the path and the birds ate it. Some seed landed on rocks, sprouted and soon withered. Some landed among thorns which choked the seedlings. And some landed on fertile soil and produced an abundant harvest. All of these being images of how God's Word is received into the lives of the people of this world.

Today's Gospel puts us back into the field. This time we find out that even though the farmer planted good wheat seed, an enemy planted weeds that look like wheat. Now that their roots have grown together the owner of the farm decides that it is best to wait and separate the wheat from the weeds at harvest time.

Our world is like this field. We experience both good and bad in life. Though we might want to escape this reality and live in a safe isolated bubble it is not possible to escape the reality of sin and evil. Our world is not perfect and on this side of heaven we will continually encounter the presence of both good and evil. We know this from the life of Jesus. You may be very, very good; you can be the Son of God and still get nailed to a cross.

Our call is to live in the world, but not to be of the world. Our responsibility in life is to follow the example of Jesus; to be a light and a leaven in the world that reflects the mercy and justice and compassion of God. Jesus didn't isolate himself from the brokenness and sinfulness of people; rather, he touched the lives of the Scribes and Pharisees as well as the Tax Collectors, Prostitutes and unclean lepers. He didn't get rid of them, blow them off or ignore them--he treated them like his brothers and sisters, all children of the same Father.

Think for a moment: Why didn't Jesus weed Judas out of his core group of disciples? After all, he knew that Judas was going to betray him. Jesus lived in the hope that Judas would have a change of heart. Why didn't Jesus weed Peter out of the twelve? Peter swore that he would never deny Jesus and yet he did...not once, not twice, but three times! Jesus didn't weed Peter out because he knew that Peter was not an evil person, he was weak. Yes, Jesus sees the weeds within us but he also sees the wheat, the potential for goodness that was placed into our heart at the very moment of conception.

When we take a good honest look into our lives we can see that each of us is a blending of a saint and a sinner. God sees the potential for goodness within all of his creation; even though we betray him and deny him, God will never give up on us.

When we look into the field of our own life, we recognize that sometimes there is a weed that we just can't seem to get rid of... maybe it is a lack of patience, a judgmental attitude, a vice or addiction, prideful feelings or the need to be #1 no matter what the cost. St. Paul would say that sometimes the good and bad grow together to keep us humble...to make us realize that we are totally dependent upon God and to remind us that just as God has shown us great mercy, we too need to reflect that same kind of love and respect and mercy to those who we encounter in the larger field of life.

Like the tiny mustard seed, the seed of faith given to us in baptism has the potential to grow and spread in amazing ways. As a common ordinary garden herb, the mustard plant has the potential of taking over a whole garden. Once this seed is planted, there is no stopping it! Jesus is saying to us...you are like this seed that holds such great potential. Don't keep your faith just to yourself...share it!
