## EdChoice Scholarships Pay Tuition

If your child attended a Dayton Public Elementary School last year or is registered to begin kindergarten at a Dayton Public Elementary School in August, you still have time to apply for an EdChoice scholarship! The State of Ohio awards EdChoice scholarships to parents of students enrolled in public schools on academic watch or in academic emergency, which is the case in all but four Dayton Public Elementary Schools. EdChoice scholarships make it possible for parents to choose a private school for their child, at no or little cost to the parents. If you have a student entering kindergarten through eighth grade in the 2013-2014 school year and that child was enrolled in a Dayton Public School or is registered for kindergarten at a Dayton Public School, contact the Catholic school in your zip code to learn how your child can attend a Catholic school and have the tuition paid in full. Applications must be completed by July 31st.

# Pastor's Corner

## Precious Blood Spirituality and the Cup/Chalice

The Precious Blood of Jesus expresses the covenant of love that is shared between God and God's people, a covenant that is unconditional and eternal. In the Bible, covenants express what it means to be in relationship with God and one another; it is our way of standing together. God's covenant assures us that we have a future full of hope because God is faithful.

In Luke's Gospel we hear of a new covenant being initiated by Jesus. This new covenant was not seen as simply a "renewal" or "extension" of the covenants of old; it was to be understood as something foundational to the new age that was opening up to the people of God.

To highlight this new age, Jesus makes a bold statement at the last supper meal, telling the disciples—to drink his blood. The drinking of blood was something forbidden by Jewish law because blood was sacred to God. But what Jesus is saying is that the blood that belongs to God now belongs to the community of those who believe in Jesus and follow him. The life-force of God is now with the disciples of Jesus in a special way through his Precious Blood which binds us together as one.

Jesus makes it clear that he is offering his own blood in place of the blood of animals. And so, when Jesus makes the statement that His blood will be shed, poured out "for you" He is not looking upon His death as an execution. Rather, He is giving His life as an act of sacrificial love. It is this sacrifice which inaugurates the new and eternal covenant which is being offered in forgiveness of and in atonement for our sins.

In the Eucharistic meal we share, the symbolism of the cup is beautifully united with the symbolism of the blood. When the cup or chalice is spoken of in scripture it is seen as a vessel used for gathering and collecting. In Luke's account of the Last Supper he speaks of two of the three cups that were traditionally offered in the Passover meal...the first cup, the Kiddush cup, a cup reflecting upon covenant and suffering, and the third cup, a cup of blessing.

To have a share in the cup of suffering is to join in the struggle against Satan and the forces of evil and injustice that are at work in society. Just as Jesus said yes to the cup of his passion and death, our yes to the cup means that we are willing to take on the sufferings of Christ's living body within our families, our parish, our city and country.

The other cup that Luke spoke of in his Gospel was the third cup in the Passover meal which was the cup of blessing. The cup of blessing is presented in celebration of and in thanksgiving for the new covenant. At each Mass, the Eucharistic cup, the chalice gathers together each of our lives, the suffering that cannot be avoided as well as the blessings of joy and hope that is found in Christ who is victorious over sin and death.

Christ offers Himself to us as food and drink for the journey, transforming us so that we can be "living chalices" for others, ready to pour out our lives as the living sacrament of Christ's blood binding us together as one. From the cup we receive the strength to work against suffering and injustice and we accept the call to work together in order to bring about God's reign. (Image of Cup adapted from writings by Fr.
