Pastor's Corner


Last week our gospel reading showed Jesus feeding five thousand men and an unknown number of women and children with five barley loaves and two small fish, a spectacular miracle. Yet, instead of a desire to develop a deeper faith, the crowd follows after Jesus looking for more food. When Jesus begins to reveal himself as the Son of Man and asks for their belief in Him, they want some additional signs to prove that he is from God.

We can hardly blame the people who were hoping that there was a solution to their pressing problem of having enough to eat. We have supermarkets, fast food restaurants and modern refrigeration and so it is difficult for us to imagine the lack of security that marked the daily experience of the people. Food was never plentiful. A small glimpse into the challenges they

faced each day was the recent power outages that came

during the summer storms.

Jesus was trying to help the people to see that he has so much more to offer than just a temporary fix to their hunger issues. He is not a generous grocer distributing free food for the people. He is offering himself as the Bread of Life! Our faith teaches us that our deepest need is not for the things God provides; our deepest need is for God.



Our true character often shines when we are confronted with the challenges of life. Just like the people of God who struggled in the wilderness we are often weak, wavering and grumbling. The people ask: "Why did you lead us out here to this God forsaken place!" So, what does God do for them? God sends them manna a word which means, "What is this?" This food that God provides is not the kind of food that they are accustomed to and it is certainly not the food they would have chosen for themselves.

At times in our lives we ask God for help and God sends us manna and yet we may not recognize the food we are being given or we are helped in ways that we did not expect. Maybe God sends us manna in the desert of our lives in the form of a family member or friend who gives us guidance for an important decision. Maybe the manna comes in the beauty of nature or the arts which nourishes our soul. Maybe the manna comes in some stories from the past that remind us of our roots and that we belong to a family. Think for a moment, what is the manna that God has fed you with this week?

Through our journey in life God is shaping us more and more into a community of believers who trust God above all things. As St. Paul reminds us we are to put on that new self, created in God's image and put away the old self of our former way of life and see that our deepest need is not for the things God provides; our deepest need is for God...for Jesus the Bread of Life.
