

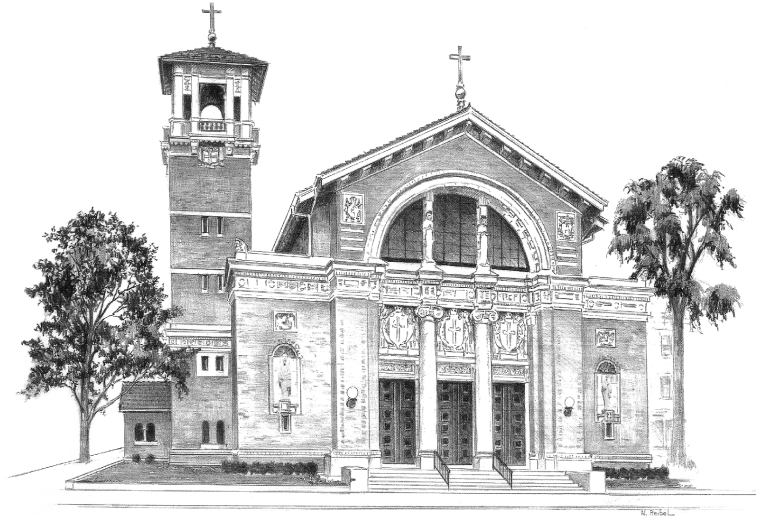

Pastor's Corner

What do you do when you experience chest pains and numbness in the arm? What if the check-engine light comes on in your car? Suppose a siren draws near to you...what do you do? What if some unexpected repairs on your home deplete your savings account and you know you have got to tighten your budget?

We recognize all kinds of wake-up calls that catch our attention in life and motivate us to action. These warning signs launch us into action because we know that a failure to act may lead to costly results. Just as we would hope to respond appropriately to these wake-up calls in our day-to-day life we need to be attentive to the spiritual wake-up calls that come our way. God is always reaching out to us in love but sometimes the Holy Spirit will give us an extra nudge to wake us from our spiritual slumber.

In this weekend's First Reading from the Prophet Amos we see Amos challenging the people because of some unfair business practices that went on in his day by people who said that they were children of God.

- ◆ Amos spoke out against those who were shrinking the ephah. The ephah was a kind of measurement a little smaller than what we call a bushel. Merchants were cheating people by using smaller sized containers yet charging the full ephah price.
- ◆ The shekel was a measuring weight and some merchants added extra weight so as to cheat the farmer.
- ◆ Some of the poor needed loans and so the wealthy agreed to give a loan if the person put themselves up as collateral, being sold as slaves when they could not pay. Amos noted that some people were being sold for the price of a pair of sandals.

In his message to the people of Israel, Amos offers a wake-up call to the people who were in spiritual danger of losing their identity as God's chosen people.

In the gospel parable for today we encounter an employee who is caught squandering his boss's property. Quickly, he develops a scheme as a way of stabilizing his uncertain future. Doing an analysis of his talents and abilities the employee recognizes that he is not cut out for manual labor but that he could win over some friends by reducing the amount of debt they owed to the boss. The amount he deducts from the debtor's bill could have been his commission or maybe interest removed from a loan. In an unexpected twist, the master commends the employee for his quick and prudent action.

The parable may seem far-fetched to us, yet, the lesson to be learned can be found in the quick and decisive action of the steward. He heeded the wake-up call and responded quickly. Do we understand that a threat to our spiritual life is also a threat to our overall well being and happiness in life?

The devil is very tricky and will slowly help us dismantle the moral fiber of our life if we are not alert. There are various ways that we can rationalize our way down the wrong path. "Oh, just one click on a pornographic website won't hurt." "I'll fudge a little on my insurance claim after all, they have plenty of money." "I'm too tired to pray today, God will understand." Slowly, yet surely our intended course directed toward heaven shifts and we find ourselves lost in darkness. There is nothing more dangerous than losing your soul. The time to act is now and God is ready to help!
