Pastor's Corner

I owe quite a bit of thanks to St. Luke for allowing me to speak through his writings. Luke, that champion of the poor and oppressed, the lost and forgotten, has a way of getting down to the heart of the matter.

Who am I? I am that rich man in today's Gospel. Historically, some have called me "Dives" but that is not my name. Dives is simply the Latin word for rich man. I am not named because all that gave me my identity in the world is gone. It is Lazarus who is now remembered. You heard something of my story today but there is more that I want to say to you.

It is true I had a very nice house, great food from various parts of the world, designer cloths like your Armani or Gucci, fancy chariots like your Lamborghini's--I was somebody--and far too important in my own eyes to be bothered by a beggar. At first, the sight of Lazarus bothered me. I was uncomfortable seeing such poverty. "Why did he lie at my door and beg?" Then the excuses began to run through my mind, "Why doesn't he get a job? I earned what I have. If I give him something he will just get booze." After a while I just didn't see him anymore--he was there but I just ignored him. It was easier that way.

How often do we take notice of the people around us—their needs, their concerns? Not just the homeless people but also, the young mother struggling to make ends meet, the teenager begin bullied, the neighbor who struggles with the news of terminal illness, the elderly person who sits at home all alone day after day or the person looking for employment but finds no work. I just didn't notice.

You know, my problems didn't begin at death. They really started much earlier than that. The more possessions I had the more I guarded them and the more isolated I became. I worried about power and prestige and positions of honor at feasts. What I forgot was the lesson I learned as a child, God is the Lord of creation and the owner of all things. Nothing really belongs to any of us. God has made us to be stewards of creation so that we can care for creation and share what has been given to us for the sake of the common good.

Oh, I have heard people say, "Hey, I earned what I have!" This may be so, but who gave you the mind, the talent, the health and the opportunity to do what you have accomplished? Did you realize that according to a report released by the World Bank, nearly 2.8 billion people, almost half the population of the planet, still live on the equivalent of two dollars a day or less. Does anybody care? Do I ask why has God permitted me to have the wealth and possession I have?

Yes, it is uncomfortable being confronted by the poor. Be grateful that you feel that way. It means you still have a conscience and a heart. Next time you are confronted with someone who is poor or in need of help ask yourself, "Why has God placed this person in my life today?" And then respond in whatever manner will further the Kingdom of God.

You have the words of the prophets; you even have the example of God's son, Jesus, who extended His arms to embrace the world. I held on to what was mine and in the end lost it all. It's no one's fault but my own. Please, do not follow my example.
