Pastor's Corner

This week there has been a discussion about which building is the tallest in the United States, the Willis (Sears) Tower in Chicago or the One World Trade Center building in New York. There is something marvelous in the construction of these skyscrapers. Even the word we use for these tall buildings lifts our minds to the heavens. As we marvel at these wonders of architecture and engineering we also recognize how quickly they can tumble to the ground and how we must always be ready for the Day of the Lord.

In today's gospel we find ourselves in the Temple where many people were speaking about the beauty of the Temple "adorned with costly stones and votive offerings." As massive and strong as that building was Jesus declares that the Temple would be destroyed and not only that, but there would be destruction that comes from war, natural disaster and personal persecution. The images that are coming from the Philippines as a result of the terrible typhoon remind us of how quickly our lives can be changed forever.

Notice in the gospel readings that the question is not "if" these terrible things will happen but "when" these things happen. From one generation to the next there have been people who have tried to predict when the end of the world will come. Jesus does not get caught up in this guessing game. His response is to reassure us that He will provide for our needs when the time of destruction comes our way. We are given this warning so that we will remain strong in faith and do not lose heart.

When trials and tribulations in life come our way it is so easy to be caught up with fear, worry, doubt and even despair. Even though we do all that we can to guard against danger, we still live with fear. Jesus instructs us to keep our focus on Him and not on the trials and tribulations. It's like a person seeking to be rescued from a tall building that is on fire. The firefighter tells the person, "Don't look down; just keep your eyes on me."

When we are confronted with personal persecution Jesus tells us not to worry, that He will give us the wisdom we need to respond to the challenge and the words that we are to say. Jesus reassures us and says, "By your perseverance you will secure your lives."

Over and over again in scripture God tells us to keep our eyes on Him, "Do not be afraid." Rather than focusing on the doomsday message that comes with trials and tribulations, Jesus asks us to nurture the virtues of hope and trust. The Day of the Lord is not about destruction and fear. The Day of the Lord is all about a new beginning that comes when we die to an old self so that we can become more and more like Jesus.

We know the end of the story. We know that Jesus is victorious over sin and death. God is faithful and He will never abandon His people. This knowledge strengthens us in our journey of life. At the same time we realize that we cannot just sit back and idly wait for the Lord to come again in glory. We are to live our faith boldly by keeping our eyes on Jesus, following His teachings and example and by staying close to our Father in heaven. Living faithfully our baptismal calling here on earth we are living into our final destiny, eternal life. Through baptism we recognize that we are more than dust—that we are made of star-dust and the creation God has made will be transformed to shine with Him forever.
