Pastor's Corner



1st Sunday of Advent

Happy New Year! No, I am not rushing the holidays. Today the church begins a new Liturgical Year with the celebration of the First Sunday of Advent. This year our scripture readings at Mass will be taken from Cycle A. In this cycle the gospel readings will mainly come from Matthew's Gospel. In this gospel Jesus is constantly reminding us of the truth that "the Kingdom of God is in your midst."

In a recent article I read that the most traveled holiday in the United States is the Thanksgiving Holiday. This year with the observance of Thanksgiving falling so late in the month of November it is even more appropriate that our scripture readings this Sunday highlight the image of travel and journey. From the prophet Isaiah we are told of a day when all nations will stream toward the mountain of the Lord. "Come, let us climb the Lord's mountain, to the house of the God of Jacob, that he may instruct us in his ways, and we may walk in his paths."

Like any driver, it is essential that you stay awake while you are on your journey. Otherwise, you could easily lose control of your vehicle or make a wrong turn and miss your destination. So too, as we begin this new liturgical year our scripture readings exhort us to "stay awake" for the Day of the Lord is near.

The Universal Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar #39 states: "Advent has a twofold character, for it is a time of preparation for the Solemnities of Christ in which the First Coming of the Son of God to humanity is remembered, and likewise a time when, by remembrance of this, minds and hearts are led to look forward to Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. For these two reasons, Advent is a period of devout and expectant delight."

In this Advent season we are invited to look joyfully for the Second Coming of Christ as we reflect upon his birth and experience his presence in the Word of God, the Sacraments and in one another. As we journey through the four weeks of Advent the light from the candles on the Advent wreath increase symbolizing the hope and expectation of a people who wait in darkness. There is something mystical and magical about the celebration of Christmas. The vision given to us from the Prophet Isaiah instinctively takes over and we see "swords being turned into plow shares" as a greater level of respect and dignity is shared between people. The childlike innocence of youth is awakened as we dream of the day when "the lion and the lamb will lie down together."

In beginning this new liturgical year, take to heart the words of the psalmist, "Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord." (Ps 122) To help you prepare for this journey please review the bulletin-insert this week and post it on your refrigerator or some prominent place in your home. You are also invited to pick up a copy of a page-a-day book of reflections to help you keep your focus on the coming of Christ at Christmas. These are available at the entrance of church. In this Advent and Christmas season keep on the lookout for the many and varied ways that the Kingdom of God is present and in your midst. Fr. Angelo
