



## *Pastor's Corner*

### **Feast of the Exultation of the Cross**

“With their patience worn out, the people complained against God. Why have you brought us to this desert? Why have you given us this wretched food? Why have you allowed all this suffering?” In some ways the sentiments being shared in today’s First Reading from the Book of Numbers reflects the mood and impatience being held in our minds and hearts as we look at today’s world and all its troubles. As we complain against God in our desert experience we need the cross of Christ lifted up before us to remind us that Jesus is victorious over sin and death.

St. Gaspar, the founder of the Missionaries of the Precious Blood, often encouraged people to read the book of the crucifix, to meditate on the image of Christ crucified and to find there the strength and humility of Christ who broke the cycle of violence and unconditionally gave Himself for the life of the world.

Today’s feast invites us to see the cross as a companion rather than something to run from. The cross reminds us that God is to be found in all things; not just the nice and pretty experiences of life, but also within the school of the cross where we learn how to love all over again. The only real answer to the prayer of a broken heart is the realization that God’s heart has been broken too. God knows our pain. But the story does not end there. At the same time we profess that God is victorious over sin and death and so we can connect our suffering with the suffering of Christ.

Seeing suffering in the context of a higher purpose is called redemptive suffering. It is like the suffering of a mother in labor who endures the pain for the sake of the child that is to be born or the suffering that an athlete endures in order to achieve the gold. As Jesus suffered upon the cross He transformed that which was an instrument of death into the very Tree of Life. The power of the cross of Christ is seen in today’s Gospel. “God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved.” (Jn 3:17)


Our joy in the cross of Christ is expressed in the words of a familiar hymn. “Lift high the cross, the love of Christ proclaim, till all the world adore his sacred name.” Lifting high the cross takes us back to the Israelite community as they wandered in the desert. The people of God had sinned and Moses made a bronze serpent and told the people, “Look at what you are and what you are doing.” The serpent represented the sin of the people and when they honestly admitted their sin they could turn to God for healing.

Jesus became one like us, “taking the form of a slave,” for the salvation of the world. When we look upon the cross we see ourselves and confess the effects of our complaining and sins.

Jesus takes the burden of our sins to the cross and we are healed and saved. From the cross we hear Jesus say, “There is nothing that I cannot transform.” If we listen to the wood of the cross we can hear God say, “You are never alone.”

**The St. Vincent de Paul District Council of Dayton** is devoted to serving those living in the Miami Valley with faith-based assistance, shelter and hope. Like so many cities across the country, the homeless population in Dayton swelled during the 1980’s and the city found it overwhelming and challenging to respond to the growing numbers of homeless.

As a result, a homeless man died during an especially long and bitter cold snap, much like we experienced this winter. When news of the circumstances of his death reached the Vincentian community, it was decided that never again would a homeless person suffer and die from exposure due to a lack of emergency shelter. Consequently, St. Vincent de Paul began the operation of its first shelter, known as the St. Vincent de Paul Hotel on Fifth Street. Since that early beginning, the St. Vincent de Paul District Council of Dayton has added the Gateway Shelter for Women & Families, the Gettysburg Gateway for Men, the Community Thrift Stores, the Food Pantries, Transitional and Supportive Housing, Safe Haven and the Furniture Bank. Today, both the Dayton District Council and parish Conferences like at Emmanuel annually serve over 100,000 people in need throughout the Miami Valley.
