Pastor's Corner

Today's parable about the vineyard workers and the pay they received may have stirred a reaction in our minds which said, "That's not fair." If those who only worked one hour received the usual daily wage it stands to reason that those who worked all day in the hot sun would receive more money. Don't we have a saying: "A fair day's pay for a fair day's work?" The beauty of a parable is that it can offer many layers of meaning for reflection.

The setting of the parable shows the vineyard owner going out to hire day laborers. As day laborers they did not have jobs that they could count on; all were needy and vulnerable hoping to earn enough money that day to feed their family. Every day they had to wait and watch and hope.

We get the impression that there is a sense of urgency found in the parable. Maybe it was harvest time for the grapes and the additional laborers were hired to make sure none of the grapes spoiled on the vine. We can imagine that the strongest workers were chosen first, similar to a game of pick-up football where the captain chooses the best players first. Those workers chosen last were probably older, handicapped or infirmed workers who also needed to provide for their families.


The purpose of a parable is to draw us into a deeper meaning about life and the Kingdom of Heaven. We are challenged to let go of our worldly perspectives and bias and to enter more deeply into the mystery of God's love for all people. All too often we cut God down to our size and put words into God's mouth telling God how things should go in life. Thank goodness God is not limited or restricted by our way of thinking.

Today's parable reminds us that the Kingdom of Heaven is not based upon our worldly standards. It is not based on the survival of the fittest. It is not based on an economy of supply and demand. There is no completion for the higher place in heaven. Everyone with the Lord in heaven will equally be one around the throne of God. The Prophet Isaiah reminds us, "Remember, my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord."

If the laborers who worked all day had not compared their wages with those who only worked an hour they would have been satisfied. They received the agreed upon wage. The problem came in when they compared their wages with what they saw the other workers receive. There has probably been a time or two when we have envied another's good fortune or special talent. The cure for envy is to recognize that we are all on this journey of life together as the body of Christ, each with a unique call from the Lord.

Rather than being envious or jealous of someone else, God asks us to celebrate the rich diversity and the many blessings that are given to the world. Jesus will ask us what we did with the talent or ability or call that he placed in our hearts. Hopefully, we have allowed love to rule our hearts and that we have been generous and rich in mercy like the owner of the vineyard in today's parable and not just looking out for number one.
