Pastor's Corner

This time of year people can be seen packing up the summer yard equipment for the winter and getting ready for snow. With the threat of snow in the forecast you decide it is time to pull out the old snow blower and you know that when you hit the starter for the first time the engine is going to sputter and kick a bit because of lack of use.

Our physical and spiritual life can quickly go bad as well if we do not exercise them and keep them tuned-up. This weekend's scripture readings call us to ask ourselves, "How am I using the gifts and talents that God has given to me?" Am I creative and industrious in using them or do I bury them in the dark or pretend that I do not have them.

In the parable of the talents from Matthew's gospel, the silver pieces were distributed according to each person's ability. Even the person entrusted with only one talent was receiving quite a bit of money because using calculations to compare the past to today's economy, a "talent" would figure out to be nearly one million dollars! All the master asked was that the servant be industrious and reliable. Two of the men in the parable, just like the wise and virtuous woman in the reading from the Book of Proverbs, used their gifts and talents freely and openly. Their efforts increased the resources entrusted to them.

The third servant in the gospel reading did not do anything but bury what was entrusted to him. He was called wicked and lazy because he knew the master's will but chose to ignore it. He let fear dominate his life. This parable challenges us to look within our hearts and to reflect upon the resources, talents and abilities that God has entrusted to each of us to build His Kingdom.

Through the waters of baptism God has given us a priceless opportunity to share in His gift of eternal life. With grateful hearts we recognize that all that we have and all that we are is gift and what is important is not so much my personal journey to heaven but who I am able to bring with me. This is how we return our gifts to God with increase.

A few years ago, our bishops summed up the call to stewardship in this way: "To receive God's gifts gratefully, to cultivate God's gifts responsibly, to share God's gifts lovingly with others and to return God's gifts—with increase—to God. Stewardship demands that we believe and trust that whatever comes our way, God will be with us. It means taking the risk of faith and following God's directive from the Book of Genesis, "Be fruitful."

The mission of our parish community is to foster a community of love that works to continue the mission of Jesus. Each of us has been given riches beyond measure! Do we hide them in fear of a God we perceive to be judgmental and vengeful or do we generously use what has been given to us in gratitude to God who loves us more than we can know. When we give of ourselves we do not lose anything. Instead, we gain eternity. How will you invest your life and the resource God has entrusted to you?
