

Pastor's Corner

On this *Gaudete* or *Rejoice* Sunday we hear from John the Baptist, a very important figure in our Advent journey. “There was a man sent by God to give testimony to the Light.” John the Baptist is an important role model for us because like John, we are to lead others to rejoice in the Light of Christ. John recognized that he was not the Light but that his job was to point to the Light, to give testimony to the truth of Christ among us. The season of Advent reminds us that we are to be the new “John the Baptist,” witnesses who testify to the Light.

Who is the Light of the world? We proclaim the truth that Jesus is the Son of God, the Light of the world. St. Mark, the author of the Gospel we will focus upon in this Liturgical Year B begins his Gospel with the bold proclamation “Here begins the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.” After making this statement of faith St. Mark immediately references the prophet Isaiah whom we heard from in our First Reading. Isaiah has an amazing announcement; the exiles from Jerusalem who had been sent off to Babylon will be able to return home. This is significant. Their Temple had been leveled, their best and the brightest had been sent away, their fields salted, their way of life totally crushed. To get an appreciation of the significance of this destruction think of something 10 times worse than 9/11.

Following the tradition of the prophets of old, John the Baptist announces Good News, amazing news, that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God and the true Light of the world. Even though the Emperor of Rome was looked upon as the son of god, John the Baptist and St. Mark both proclaim the truth that Jesus is the true Son of God. As witnesses to this truth, each of us is to stand up to all the worldly powers and figures of authority of this world and say, “You are imposters.” “You are not the real deal!” The season of Advent challenges us to “wake up” and to realize the One who is truly in charge.



This gives us cause for rejoicing because we are no longer held hostage by an image of self that is tied to fashion or an understanding of success that is based upon commercialism or a moral compass that says take down anyone or anything you need to get to the top. We need not live in exile from the Body of Christ. God desires for us to claim our birthright as children of God and to live in the Light of this truth.

The message of John the Baptist is all about bringing others to Christ. Like John we are to build a highway leading others back to God. By our joy, by our example of living in the Truth, we point the way to Jesus. Your generous heart, your hospitality to the stranger, the smile you wear, the enthusiasm you radiate, the hope you inspire, the faith you profess, the forgiveness you share, the kindness you practice all help to point the way to Christ. This is what Pope Francis speaks about in his Apostolic Exhortation “The Joy of the Gospel.” The Church grows by attraction. The Pope writes, “The joy of the Gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. Those who accept his offer of salvation are set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. With Christ—joy is constantly born anew.” You cannot help but be joyful with this Good News!
