

Pastor's Corner

So far in our Lenten journey we have been with Jesus as he was tempted in the desert and we have been up on the mountain top with Peter, James and John witnessing the transfiguration of Jesus. This week we find ourselves in the temple as Jesus overturned the tables of the money changers. In all three instances we have encountered the living presence of God hearing the call to on-going conversion. The story of the cleansing of the temple is found in all four gospels, but it is John who puts this incident at the beginning of his gospel to signify that a new era has begun.

Jesus loved the temple and appreciated its capacity to express the presence of God here on earth. It was clear to Jesus that other priorities had taken over and the focus of the temple had become a marketplace. During this Lenten season Jesus desires to enter the temple of our hearts so that they might be cleansed of the barriers that keep us from God and one another.

What are the barriers that keep us from encountering the presence of the living God? All too often our priorities become confused and we spend most of our time pursuing material wealth, prestige or unhealthy habits. We make gods out of power, wealth, security or status and no longer love the Lord God above all things.

Just as Jesus goes into the temple to clean house; so too, we must cleanse our hearts in this season of Lent. We must drive out useless, meaningless and destructive clutter that keeps us from recognizing the priceless value of life. We must focus our energies upon building God's Kingdom and not our own kingdom. Jesus wants us to re-set our priorities and to give ourselves over to God, making the temple of our body a place for Christ to reign. If we want to please God above all things then we are to love God above all things.

Archdiocesan Capital Campaign: Just as our ancestors expressed their faith by building our beautiful churches and schools so that the lives of the next generation would be rooted in the rock of our faith, so too, we in this current generation must do what we can to ensure that the Catholic faith will be strengthened and have a solid foundation for the next generation. This is the vision of Archbishop Schnurr as he announces the One Faith, One Hope, One Love Archdiocesan Capital Campaign.

The goal of the campaign is to raise \$130 million dollars to help address needs in the following areas: Catholic Education, Fostering Vocations, Caring for Retired Diocesan Priests, Catholic Charities and Social Services and providing support for Local Parish Priorities. None of the money raised through this campaign will go into the treasury of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. A separate 501 c 3 organization called, the Catholic Community Foundation, has been formed to oversee the funds and their distribution. This Foundation is governed by a Board made up of the Archbishop and qualified laity.

The active fundraising part of our campaign has begun and will take place over the next couple of months. In order to begin the work of this campaign, I have asked a few parishioners to become involved in key campaign leadership positions. Our executive committee is as follows: Libbie Worley-Chair, Fred Pfeiffer, Beth & Steve Byington and Rita Zimmerman. You will learn more about this campaign in the coming weeks. Please become involved when asked, offer your prayerful support, listen to the volunteers who contact you and consider giving a sacrificial gift to this important campaign. Working together we can not only transform ourselves, we can transform the world!

The Missionaries of the Precious Blood,

who celebrate 200 years as a religious congregation this year, were founded by St. Gaspar del Bufalo in Italy in 1815. Saint Gaspar's devotion to the Precious Blood was due in large part to his spiritual director, Father Francesco Albertini, who went into exile with him after Napoleon conquered Italy and drove out priests like Gaspar who refused to take an oath of loyalty to the new regime. Albertini was inspired by a relic of the Precious Blood at his church in Rome, and established the Archconfraternity of the Precious Blood. It began as an association of lay people, who would be energized by devotion to the Blood of Christ to engage in ministry to the many neglected people in that busy part of the city of Rome. Albertini came to see Gaspar as the foundation of a branch of missionary men, and the Congregation was founded under the auspices of the Archconfraternity in 1815.
