Pastor's Corner

During last week's Parish Mission Fr. Steve invited us to ponder the action of Jesus mounting the cross as an act of love. Jesus was not forced to be nailed to the cross; He mounted the cross of His own free will. Lifted high on the cross we see Jesus reaching out his arms and embracing the world, drawing all people to himself. This is the cause of our joy on this Laetare Sunday as all three readings focus upon the unconditional love and mercy of God.

In our reading from Second Chronicles we learned that even though the people of God had walked away from His covenant of Love and through their sinfulness found themselves in exile, God never gave up on His people, but kept reaching out to them in love and mercy. Death and destruction was not to be the last word. Rather, God uses the darkness of the Babylonian exile as a backdrop to the bright promise of new life! In a most unsuspecting way, God uses a pagan, Cyrus, King of Persia to conquer the Babylonians and inspires King Cyrus to allow the people of God to return home and to build a house of God in Jerusalem.

St. Paul says clearly in the second reading that "God, who is rich in mercy, because of the great love he had for us, even when we were dead in our transgressions, brought us to life with Christ." In order to enter more fully into the depth of God's love for us in this scripture passage it is helpful to note that one of the translations for the word mercy comes from the Hebrew word for womb. This insight draws us to think about the image from the Prophet Isaiah: "Can a mother forget her infant, be without tenderness for the child within her womb? Even should she forget, God says, I will never forget you." (Is 49:15)

Our Gospel reading includes one of the most famous passages of scripture...John 3:16..."For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him might not perish but might have eternal life." This quote is situated in the context of an Old Testament Story in which Moses is ordered to make a bronze serpent and put it on a pole as a remedy for the Israelites who had rebelled and sinned against God even though God had rescued them from slavery. Those who looked upon the bronze serpent were healed. This image became a symbol of Jesus on the cross.

From the cross of Christ we see how much God loves us, embracing all of creation as THE authentic witness of love, redeeming us through his Precious Blood. We are at the mid-way point in our Lenten journey. Are you drawing closer to the Lord or has life slipped back into the old habits of selfishness, pride, envy, lust, greed, dishonesty, abusive anger or any behavior that speaks of living in darkness. Today, Jesus invites us to choose the light, to seek God's love and mercy, for each of us to reclaim our unique identity as a child of God.

One Faith, One Hope, One Love Campaign

For the next five weeks we will highlight one aspect of the Archdiocesan Capital Campaign in the bulletin. This week our attention is drawn to Catholic Charities and Catholic Social Services. Some 131,000 people are served annually from these two agencies, many of whom are out of work for the first time, families with young children, older adults, refugees/immigrants, at-risk youth, women in crisis pregnancies and those who benefit from mental health counseling. These agencies provide food for five million meals annually through food banks, pantries and soup kitchens. The need is very real and growing. By increasing services, these agencies will be able to provide a higher level and quality of service by:

- ◆ Providing specific programming to parishes and the community to reach 25,000 people with the Gospel message to serve the poor.
- ◆ Expanding care management and enable 32,000 more families to improve their life situations.
- ◆ Developing self-sufficiency for many more people through job readiness, literacy, healthy choices, GED, financial skills, and legal services.
- ◆ Investing further in parish/community food pantries, nutrition programs, and the Second Harvest Food Bank to deliver an additional 7.5 million meals to reduce hunger.
- ◆ Increasing volunteer hours by 128,000.
- ◆ Increasing effectiveness through technology and facility upgrades to serve 67,000 more individuals.

10 million dollars of the campaign has been designated for Catholic Charities and Social Services.

Nearly all the population were demoralized and terrorized by tribes of roaming bandits. Some of the causes of this situation were poverty, usury, mismanagement of affairs by civil and military authorities, who were in collusion with the vilest elements.

St. Gaspar proved to be successful in meeting the challenges posed to him by church leaders to take the mission to the bandits. Many of the bandits, to whom he preached, became his protector during his missionary visits. Despite this St. Gaspar's followers were concerned of his safety as he traveled in the Papal States. ***"Show me a climate in which no one dies, and I will go there."***

This may be a good week to pray for the people in our world today who are under similar circumstances and the Precious Blood and other missionaries who are trying to help them.
