Pastor's Corner

On Wednesday, in his weekly audience, Pope Francis praised families “for the ‘hidden heroism’ of caring for a sick loved one.” This line has stayed with me as I have reflected upon the scripture readings that are given to us for this Sunday. The hidden heroes are those who like the tiny mustard seed make a tremendous difference in ushering in the Reign of God through their tenderness and courage in caring for someone who is sick or in need. What a wonderful testimony to the respect for life that we are called to honor.


As we resume Ordinary Time this week, St. Paul reminds us in his Second Letter to the Corinthians that “We walk by faith and not by sight.” With so many advancements in technology, science and communication we can begin to feel very independent and begin to think that we are the ones in charge of life. Our overly-booked schedules and over worked lives can give us the illusion that everything depends upon us. Yet, our faith teaches us that God is not dependent upon our human efforts to establish His reign and that we must continually turn our lives over to God’s care.

The Prophet Ezekiel is writing to the people of God who are suffering in exile. Though they have been brought low, the Lord God will take a tender shoot of faith from among the people and create a new future for the People of God. But one doesn’t have to be a majestic cedar to make a difference in the world. Jesus takes this image from the Prophet Ezekiel and creates a different picture by saying that something as ordinary as a mustard seed can change the world. The mustard seed, basically a common weed so small and insignificant, can become a resting place for the birds of the air just like a majestic cedar.

There are hidden heroes all around us who are like the tiny mustard seeds; people who by their very actions point the way to the Kingdom of God. In simple yet courageous ways they walk by faith and not by sight. They trust that God is at work in all things often hidden from plain sight, providing the gifts of the Spirit to help us in our weakness. With the eyes of faith we can see that God will accomplish more than we could ever imagine.

Some of the Pharisees thought they could silence the voice of Jesus by putting him to death, but instead the resurrection brought forth abundant life for all. The Holy Spirit used St. Gaspar del Bufalo as a tiny seed to begin a world-wide congregation dedicated to the reconciling Blood of Christ. Blessed Teresa of Calcutta was barely five foot tall and yet her humble calling enabled her to tower as a beacon of hope to so many in need. The love of a wife caring for her husband afflicted with Alzheimer’s teaches her children the depth of the covenant of love. Lauren Hill, the girls’ basketball player from Cincinnati, inspired thousands of people by her commitment to life and indomitable spirit against terrible odds. When we walk by faith and not by sight we learn to never simply rely on ourselves and to never give up on God.
