Pastor's Corner

Pope Francis recently said, "Families are the domestic Church, where Jesus grows; he grows in the love of spouses, he grows in the lives of children. That is why the enemy so often attacks the family. The devil does not want the family; he tries to destroy it, to make sure that there is no love there. Families are this domestic Church."

This week's World Meeting of Families reminds us of the many and varied ways that God will speak to us, sometimes in and through the people we least expect. That was the dynamic going on within our readings from the Book of Numbers and the Gospel. Both Joshua and John make the mistake of presuming that only those within the circle of believers could share in the work of the Lord. In both instances the Holy Spirit came upon those who were outside the approved circle of leaders strengthening them for ministry. God cannot be confined to our understanding of order or the structures we establish to announce the gospel.

Just as in last week's message where Jesus taught his disciples that if one wants to be great he must serve the needs of all, this week Jesus continues his instruction on leadership by cautioning those who in their righteousness can lead others astray. The "little ones" Jesus was referring to are those who are weak in faith; who are still learning what it means to be a child of God. Our bad example can be a poison that destroys the innocence of another person and lead them to sin. We can lead the innocent astray by gossiping, using God's name in vain, accessing inappropriate websites, yelling in anger at one's spouse or children, making fun of others or failing to see the face of Christ in each person.

By use of the rhetorical devise of hyperbole Jesus exaggerates the extent to which we should go to get rid of temptations in our life. He is not supporting the mutilation of our body by cutting off our hand, or foot or removing our eyes to get rid of temptation. Rather, he wants us to be aware of how our eyes can lead us into sin or our feet take us to objectionable places. Jesus wants us to know that preparing for eternity is serious business. If you are aware of something that leads you to sin it is time to root it out of your life, to get serious about freeing yourself from that sin.

This week ask God to clear your vision, to cleanse your hands and to guide your feet away from trouble so that you might see as God sees and lead others to Christ, particularly those within your own family. As Pope Francis has said, we must, "keep before us the beauty of the family and marriage, the greatness of this human reality which is so simple and yet so rich..." In doing so we are preparing ourselves for the gift of eternal life. Fr. Angelo

Holy Family Icon for the World Meeting of Families by Neilson Carlin

From front to back, the figures have been intentionally layered to indicate the proximity of their relationship to Christ. In the extreme foreground, practically walking out of the canvas, stands the infant, his eyes fixed firmly on the viewer, extending a sign of blessing situated in the exact center of the painting. Next to him, the Blessed Mother, with a gaze slightly beyond her son as she looks toward his passion, fully aware of the trial yet to begin for her family for the sake of all families. Just behind stands St. Joseph, gently resting a loving and protective hand on his wife; his hand completes the chain of connection that begins with Christ's hand, which rests gently on his mother's. Behind all stand Mary's mother and father, SS. Ann and Joachim. They, along with Mary and Joseph, all turn in the direction of Christ. With pensive faces, their joy comes not from the removal of suffering with the coming of Our Lord, but from a firm and steadying reliance on Christ as their morning star, guiding them through the storms of life.

On the upper left is a depiction of the coat-of-arms of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia where the 2015 World Meeting of Families will convene. On the upper right is the coat-of-arms of His Holiness, Pope Francis, under whose pontifical aegis the meeting will be guided. On the bottom, a reminder of the year in which the World Meeting of Families will be celebrated. Situated all around are white lilies, a reminder of the purity of the Holy Mother.
