PASTOR'S PEN...

On Tuesday, March 15th from 6:00am until 6:00pm at St. Joseph Church the Missionaries of the Precious Blood will be hosting a *Day of Mercy* in response to Pope Francis' call for the Catholic Church to observe a year of study and reflection on the virtue of mercy. Throughout the day the faithful can stop in and participate in the sacrament of reconciliation, receive spiritual guidance or pray before the Blessed Sacrament.

The motto for the Year of Mercy is "Be merciful as your Father is merciful." The very nature of God is mercy and since we have been created in God's image and likeness we are called to be the face of mercy to others. Looking back on salvation history we can see that the message of God's mercy runs throughout the bible. God's merciful plan is to restore the order that was lost by original sin. We might say that salvation history is one long love story in which our merciful God seeks to draw us back into communion with him.

When we talk about being merciful we are not talking about simply having an attitude that is less judgmental of ourselves and others. Mercy is more than feeling sorry for someone else. As Fr. George Kosicki, CSB once said, "Mercy is having a pain in your heart for the pain in another person's heart." This pain motivates you to action. Mercy cannot simply be present in our words; it must also be present in our living. The violence that we see escalating around us is due in part to the reality that we have lost the virtue of mercy in our culture.

Everything in the life of Jesus was a message of mercy. Whether he was reaching out to the lost, healing the sick, teaching with parables or crossing boundaries set up by law or culture, Jesus revealed the Father's mercy as a gift of love.

Today's gospel offers us a tremendous picture of mercy. In reflecting upon the gospel of the woman who was going to be stoned for committing adultery St. Augustine summarized the scene by saying, "there are left the two—misery and mercy." She is miserable, he is merciful. Mercy is an expression of love. Like Jesus we are to learn how to expand our heart to respond to the pain of another person.

The Pharisees said Jewish law demanded that she be stoned. Roman law removed the authority from Jewish courts to render the death sentence upon anyone. Once again the Pharisees were trying to trap Jesus in a corner to see whether he would support Jewish law or Roman law. Jesus responds in an act of mercy by bending down to write on the ground maybe with a stone in his hand. He de-escalates the tension that was building and invites people to ponder in their own hearts, "Let the one among you who is without sin cast the first stone." Jesus turns the conversation back to the heart of each person and everyone drifts away. He doesn't judge them but rather, asks them to consider their own sinful lives. If their sin was made public wouldn't they want someone to show them mercy?

Jesus acknowledges that the woman has sinned, but he does not condemn her. He sets her on the right path and tells her to sin no more. Jesus is the only one without sin and therefore the only one who is to judge. Rather than rendering judgment Jesus chooses to forgive, to reveal the Father's mercy. How are you being called to be an instrument of mercy today?

Corporal Works of Mercy Series: Visit the Imprisoned In the early Christian community there were many members of the faithful who were imprisoned because of their faith. While in prison both Sts. Peter and Paul speak of the consolation they found in people praying for them. Throughout scripture we see that God's mercy is extended to the good and the bad alike. When we sin we do not lose our identity as children of God. There is always hope of conversion for those who have committed crimes. We hear the call to forgive others because God has forgiven us. We can show God's mercy by visiting or writing letters to those in prison. We can also pray for those who are incarcerated as well as those imprisoned through addictions or youth held against their will in child trafficking. Care and outreach for the families of those who are imprisoned is also a very important aspect of this corporal work of mercy.

Year of Mercy

"The season of Lent during this Jubilee Year should also be lived more intensely as a privileged moment to celebrate and experience God's mercy. How many pages of Sacred Scripture are appropriate for meditation during the weeks of Lent to help us rediscover the merciful face of the Father! We can repeat the words of the prophet Micah and make them our own: You, O Lord, are a God who takes away iniquity and pardons sin, who does not hold your anger forever, but are pleased to show mercy. You, Lord, will return to us and have pity on your people. You will trample down our sins and toss them into the depths of the sea."

We will have our annual St. Patrick's Day Mass at St. Joseph's on Thursday, March 17, starting at 12 noon. There will be a bagpiper, the Knights of Columbus, and an Irish priest celebrating. All are invited.


