PASTOR'S PEN

As we celebrate Father's Day I am reminded of a story that speaks to the character that Jesus sought to build within the minds and hearts of his disciples.

David Kraft was a big, strong man -- all muscle. At the age of 32, he was six feet, two inches tall and weighed 200 pounds. He had been to seminary and ended up working with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, because of his athletic background. Then he was diagnosed with cancer. It wracked his body, and over a period of time, he dropped from 200 pounds to 80 pounds.

When he was about ready to pass from this life into eternity, he asked his father to come into his hospital room. Lying there in bed, he looked up and said, "Dad, do you remember when I was a little boy, how you used to hold me in your arms close to your chest?" David's father nodded. Then David said, "Do you think, Dad, you could do that one more time? One last time?"

Again his father nodded. He bent down to pick up his 32-yearold, six-foot, two-inch, 80 pound son, and held him close to his chest, so that the son's face was right next to the father's face. They were eyeball to eyeball. Tears were streaming down both faces, and the son said to his father, "Thank you for building the kind of character into my life that can enable me to face even a moment like this." *(Story from Ron Lee Davis, "Introducing Christ to Your Child")*

This was the kind of character that Jesus was building in the minds and hearts of his Disciples; an awareness of self as a child of God that would enable them to face anything in life. As St. Pope John Paul II once noted, "Jesus is a mirror in which we can see who we are. He shows us our human possibilities and potentials."

In today's gospel Jesus questions the disciples about their thoughts concerning the identity of their teacher. He asks, "Who do people say that I am?" Responding with the words they heard out on the streets they identified Jesus as John the Baptist, Elijah or one of the ancient prophets. Then Jesus gets personal and asks them, "Who do you say that I am?" This is a question that we must respond to over and over again in our lives. As our relationship with Jesus grows we learn to trust him more and to face the challenges and the crosses that come our way with peace and acceptance of the Fathers' will in our lives.

All too often we say "Yes, Jesus, You are the Christ," but turn around and follow our own wishes choosing wealth over service; following the crowd instead of living in integrity of heart; accumulating more and more instead of giving away; pushing to be in control rather than having an understanding heart; or holding someone in un-forgiveness instead of showing mercy.

Jesus is seeking to build within us the character that will enable us to face whatever life may throw our way. To be a disciple of Jesus means that we develop a life of prayer so that we can be attentive to what God wants us to hear, open to what God wants us to see and spiritually mature to take up our cross and follow Him.

God our Father, You govern and protect your people and shepherd them with a father's love. You place a father in a family as a sign of your love, care, and constant protection.

May fathers everywhere be faithful to the example shown in the Scriptures: steadfast in love, forgiving transgressions, sustaining the family, caring for those in need.

Give your wisdom to fathers that they may encourage and guide their children. Keep them healthy so they may support a family. Guide every father with the Spirit of your love that they may grow in holiness and draw their family ever closer to you. Amen. (Author Unknown)

June 21st begins Fortnight for Freedom 2016. This effort is meant to raise awareness regarding the gift of religious freedom and the



witness we can offer to safeguard this fundamental human right. The USCCB offers the following reflection on the Vatican II document "Dignitatis Humanae".

"Religious freedom includes two important aspects freedom from and freedom for. "Freedom from" is probably familiar and what most of us think of as freedom. It means that we are to be free from coercion. The state is not an allpowerful institution that can force people to act against their consciences."

"The right to be free from coercion limits the power of the state. But this freedom must be paired with a "freedom for," a positive orientation to seeking and acting in accordance with the truth. People have both a right and a duty to seek religious truth. Freedom from coercion allows the space for the pursuit of religious truth. Religious freedom requires that a society both refrain from preventing people from living out their religion and help to create the conditions for religious expression to flourish. A free society, then, is one where people actively seek religious truth and fully live out that truth in public and private."

"The social dimension of religious freedom entails that religious freedom includes the freedom to practice our faith

in public. In our culture, some tend to think that religious liberty means only that individuals can worship without interference from the government. This understanding is inadequate. Religious schools, hospitals, and charities should be able to operate in accordance with their faith. Indeed, the work of these organizations is part and parcel of their faith. They are expressions of religious mission, and religions must have the space to live out their missions."

On Tuesday, June 28th at 7:00 PM everyone is invited to participate in a special gathering at Emmanuel Church for prayer and reflection on this important issue. The evening will include benediction, adoration, prayers and a homily by Deacon Rusty entitled "Catholicism is not for Cowards—Bringing Christ to a Fallen World." Following the time of prayer there will be an opportunity for questions and answers with Deacon Rusty. Please join us for this special night of prayer for our country in these challenging times.
