PASTOR'S PEN

Our scripture readings this weekend invite us to live in freedom. Not the kind of freedom the world promotes in which a person desires to be free so that they can do whatever they want. No, the kind of freedom St. Paul speaks of is to be found in the life of a person of faith who can turn their personal will over to the Will of God.

This kind of freedom is found in the call of Elisha. He owned 12 oxen. You may as well have said that he owned 12 Cadillacs! The author of the First Book of Kings wants us to know that Elisha was very wealthy and he had the resources to do whatever he wanted with his life. Yet, Elijah came into the picture and helped him to discover true freedom, a freedom to let go of everything. Elisha didn't just leave the oxen; he butchered them, burned his plow equipment and gave the food to his people. I can imagine that more than a few people looked at him in disbelief. Has Elisha lost his mind? No, his story is a call to be free enough to let go of who I am today for what I can become! Am I free enough to let go of who I am for what I can become?

This is what Jesus was stressing in today's Gospel reading. He was on his way to Jerusalem and he knew well what this decision was going to mean. The disciples were stuck in their old stinkin' thinkin' and were offended and angered by the Samaritans who did not welcome them. Jesus rebukes the disciples and challenges them to let go of their bruised egos and vindictive behavior. In the same way, are there hurts we hang on to? If so, can I be free enough to let go of my old self for what I can become?

Jesus has shown us that this call to live in the freedom of God's children demands total dedication. Being true to the call we have received sometimes means letting go of the creature comforts of life for the sake of the reign of God. What must I leave behind to be sincere in my desire and true to my call to follow Jesus today?

Then Jesus pushes the envelope even further and states rather bluntly that there may even be times when our family can be a hindrance to God's will. The journey that Jesus is making to Jerusalem is our journey. If we are going to be faithful to the call that God has placed in our hearts then we must trust Jesus. We must let go and let God. In other words, I must be free enough to let go of who I am today for what I can become. Trusting in God we pray, *"You will show me the path of life, fullness of joys in your presence, the delights at your right hand forever."*

Blessed Teresa of Calcutta (1910-1997) Mother Teresa dedicated herself to the connection between worship of the Eucharist and works of mercy. Try to do the same in the houses of the dying you visit: there you will discover Jesus in the guise of pain." When speaking of her sisters, "We are not social workers, teachers, nurses or doctors.... Everything we do—prayer, work, sacrifices—we do for Jesus." Mother Teresa will be canonized a saint on September 4, 2016.
