#### **PASTOR'S PEN**

Three men were discussing the best way to pray. One man said: "The best way to pray is in church. The second said: "I pray best standing with my arms outstretched." The third man said: "I think the best way to pray is kneeling." Overhearing their conversation, an electrician said: "For what it's worth guys, the best praying I ever did was hanging from a telephone pole during an electric storm."

The last several weeks we have been journeying with Jesus as he goes up to Jerusalem. We heard the story of the Good Samaritan and the message that you cannot love God without loving your neighbor. Last week we heard of the importance of being attentive to Jesus in the story of Martha and Mary. Along this journey Jesus is forming his disciple to understand more clearly what it means to love God. Today the focus is on Prayer. Both the first reading and the gospel draw our attention to the importance of prayer and more specifically, to be persistent in prayer.

A key component of any relationship is communication. Prayer is our communication with God. Prayer can take many forms, like the liturgical prayer of the Mass, devotional prayer like the rosary, meditative and contemplative prayer. Prayer can be expressed in music, art, dance and it can be experienced at church, in nature or at home.

In the first reading we see Abraham in a conversation with God. It seems like an unusual conversation; Abraham is bargaining with God in the way a merchant and a customer haggle in the market place over the price of some article. The beautiful message we receive in this exchange is about the mercy of God. God is so amazing that He is willing to be merciful to a whole population found in two cities for the sake of a few innocent people. This is a beautiful story about God whose mercy goes beyond what we could imagine.

We are also given an image of prayer that is important for us to ponder. In his prayer, his communication with God, Abraham is very honest and persistent. He is not trying to sugar coat the situation. He knows how bad Sodom and Gomorrah are...and yet he still speaks out on behalf of the people. Is there anything or anyone that we feel like giving up on? Some situation that we believe is hopeless? Be persistent in prayer...do not give up! God is listening!

In the Gospel we see Jesus teaching the disciples about their dependence upon God and how prayer reminds us that we need God. Luke's account of the "Our Father" prayer is very communal, we hear..."Give us each day...Forgive us our sins... subject us not to the trial." Every time we pray this prayer at Mass we are seeking to be faithful and persistent, bringing our lives as they are before the Lord.

The daily bread we receive today and each time we come to the Eucharist is the Body of Christ given for our life and the life of the world. We come with our daily hungers to be filled, our worries to be lightened, our fears to be calmed, and most especially our sins to be forgiven. St. Paul reminds us of this gift when he states: "our transgressions have been nailed to the cross, they are forgiven!

And so in faith we gather today taking to heart the instruction of Jesus: "Ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." We don't just ask once...we are persistent and honest in our prayer, presenting whatever we are feeling, pouring out our hearts so that they can be filled with the wisdom, understanding, knowledge, right judgment, courage...all the gifts of the Spirit needed to place our trust in God, remembering once again that we must abide in God's time and not ours and that with God all things are possible.

#### Saints in Mercy series:

St. Tèrése of Lisieux (1873-1897) She wrote her autobiography, *The Story of a Soul*, to share with others her reflections upon the mercies of the Lord. She notes what a joy it is to think that God is Just, that He takes into account our weakness and is perfectly aware of our fragile nature and so, we should not fear.

St. Tèrése says, "God is moved to show mercy just as a parent is moved by the presence of a child who has fallen." A parent does not hold back but responds in loving mercy. Writing to a missionary priest who was fearful of God's Judgment Tèrése replied: "I know one must be very pure to appear before the God of all Holiness, but I know too, that the Lord is infinitely just; and it is this justice which frightens so many souls that is the object of my joy and confidence....I expect as much from God's justice as from His mercy. It is because he is just that He is compassionate and filled with gentleness, slow to punish, and abundant in mercy, for He knows our frailty, He remembers we are only dust. As a father has tenderness for his children, so the Lord has compassion on us (Ps 103). This is, Brother, what I think of God's justice; my way is all confidence and love. I do not understand souls who fear a Friend so tender. (Letter 226)
