PASTOR'S PEN

In today's gospel, Jesus offers us the parable of the laborers in the vineyard. In this parable, the laborers who only worked one hour received the same daily wage as the laborers who worked a full day in the hot sun. I suspect you are thinking, "That's not fair." After all, don't we teach, "A fair day's pay for a fair day's work."

The setting for today's parable shows the owner of the vineyard going out to hire day laborers. These workers were not salaried or under any contract so they could not count on having a job each day. All of them were needy and vulnerable, hoping to earn enough that day to feed their family.

Human nature being as it is, the strongest workers were chosen first, like a game of pick-up football where the captain chooses the strongest players first. The workers chosen last were probably older, handicapped or infirmed workers who also needed to provide for their families.

Today's parable reminds us that the Kingdom of Heaven is not based upon our worldly standards such as the survival of the fittest or an economy of supply and demand. There is no competition for the higher place in heaven; all will be treated as equals around the throne of God.

Jesus wants us to see that the work of building the Kingdom of God needs to be done and that all who respond to God's call to work in the vineyard will be paid equally, that is, the gift of salvation. This gift of salvation is not based on merit, power or time worked.

If the laborers who worked a full day had been living the values found in the Kingdom of Heaven they would have celebrated the generosity of the owner of the vineyard, saying, "Isn't it wonderful that he gave us all the same pay. Now everyone has what they need to make it through another day."

But that's not how the day-long workers saw it. Even though they received the agreed upon wage they were thinking from a worldly perspective and said, "This is not fair." They were envious of what the others received. No doubt there has been a time or two when we have envied a friend's good fortune or special talent.

The cure for envy is to name our blessings and to recognize that we are all on this journey of life together as the body of Christ. Whether you are 8 years old, 25, 50 or 90 years old God provides for us in accord with each one's needs which is different for each person.

Every time we pray the Our Father prayer we say: "Give us this day our daily bread." In a sense, we are like day laborers. Each of us stands in a position of absolute dependency upon God. God doesn't owe us anything for the labor we do. What He gives is given from a heart that is generous and unconditionally loving.

On the last day, Jesus will ask us what we did with the talent or call that he placed in our hearts. Hopefully, we followed the example of the owner of the vineyard and allowed love to rule our hearts so that we were generous, full of mercy and compassion.
