Catholic sacramental records (baptism, marriage and death registers) are a rich source of information in family history. They confirm family movements, relationships, and activities within the life of the Church. Sacramental records are available to researchers from the Archdiocese of Cincinnati Archives and can provide information that civil records often lack. A presenta-tion will be given on the basic topics of sacramental records, how to access them, and other resources. Q & A will follow.

Major topics to be covered:

- -History of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati
- -History of Region 7 Downtown Dayton Catholic Churches and their founders
- -Information found in Sacramental Records
- -How to read the Registers
- -Local resources to find the parish your ancestors attended.
- -Developments in access to these records.

Sacramental records are a key primary source in putting together family trees. They can reveal unknown family members and link branches in your tree. Family historians attending this workshop will come away with a thorough understanding of what information is available through the Archdiocese of Cincinnati Archives, how to access it, how to read the records, which are often in Latin or the vernacular language of the ethnic parish (especially the German, Irish and Hispanic cultures), and tips for breaking through walls.
