PASTOR'S PEN

As the season of Advent comes to a close our scripture readings invite us to renew our faith in God by opening our hearts to his living Word. The role models we are given in today's gospel are Mary and Elizabeth. Both are open to God's word which reveals an unexpected promise. It is amazing to consider that these two women were chosen to play such an important role in the story of salvation history because in that time women were often marginalized in society. How beautiful it is to hear about one unborn child, John in the womb of Elizabeth, recognizing the child Jesus within Mary's womb whose life would have only begun some 10 days earlier. St. Luke is reminding us that God often comes to us in simple and humble ways, a truth that can easily be missed in our day-to-day living.

A question to ponder in these final days before Christmas is this: "Is my heart open to the revelation that God wants to share with me this Christmas?" All too often we are attracted to focus upon the material things in life instead of the profound experience of God's abiding presence. Today's message about Mary and Elizabeth may hold the key. Elizabeth says of Mary: "Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled." (Luke 1:45)

It is faith that helps us to accept God's plan and it is faith that finds a home in hearts that are open and pure rather than hearts that are rocked by worry or fear, selfish desires or schedules and priorities that are out of balance. The hearts of Mary and Elizabeth were open and marked by humble acceptance of God's Word to them. What is it in your heart that you need to let go of so that you can rejoice in the coming feast of Christmas?

The author Sue Monk Kidd in her book *From When the Heart Waits* writes about her visit to a monastery around Christmas years ago. She passed a monk walking outside the church and said "Merry Christmas." And the monk replied, "May Christ be born in you." At the time, Ms. Kidd thought that this was a very odd greeting. But she never forgot it. And, with time, she came to realize the power of the simple greeting: "May Christ be born in you." When Christ dwells within us, there is peace, joy and life.

Thís Chrístmas, "May Chríst be born ín you."

As St. John Paul II once wrote: "*The Word who found a dwelling in Mary's womb comes to knock on the heart of every person*…" We often come to understand that living Word through the experiences and people God places in our lives. Recounting the visitation of Mary and Elizabeth reminds us how important it is to wait in hope affirming for one another that what we wait for is worth the wait.

When we clear our hearts of all the distractions of day-to-day living we can see that there is cause for rejoicing. Elizabeth and Mary realized that the events that the prophets of old spoke about are coming to pass. The Messiah has entered the world! This truth needs to capture our hearts this Christmas. We have the benefit of seeing God's plan of salvation come to life and we know the end of the story. We know that Christ revealed his mercy and love for us by pouring out his life blood upon the cross and now he reigns in glory.

Our joy is not the kind of joy that comes from winning a prize or the lottery. No, our joy is found in the realization that Good has won the victory over sin and death. This is why our witness is so important. We who believe in the miracle of Christmas and the resurrection of Christ are to be living examples of Christ—His love, truth, justice, hope, fidelity and peace. And when we grow weary we simply need to remember all that Christ has done for us and the glory that is to be revealed in the life to come. This Christmas, "May Christ be born in you."

Silent Night celebrates its 200th Anniversary. Two hundred year ago this Christmas Eve, in the year 1818, the beloved Christmas hymn "Silent Night" was sung for the first time in the Church of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf, Austria. Originally penned as a poem by Fr. Josef Mohr, Fr. Mohr asked his church organist, Franz Xavier Gruber to put the poem to music. Because the church organ was broken, the melody was set to the accompaniment of a guitar. The simple origin of this hymn reflects the beauty of that holy night when Christ was born in a humble stable revealing the depth of God's love for us.
