PASTOR'S PEN

Today's Solemnity of the Baptism of the Lord marks the close of the Christmas season. The church puts this feast at the end of the Christmas season to remind us that the truth and beauty of Christmas does not end, but rather, like Jesus we are entrusted with a mission given to us at the time of our baptism. Our mission is to keep the flame of faith alive in our heart always following Christ's example of unconditional love.

In the Gospel we hear straight from the mouth of God the Truth that Jesus is the beloved Son of God! With these words the Holy Spirit descended upon Jesus and we are given a clear revelation of the gift of the Holy Trinity, the communion of love found in the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

In today's gospel, St. Luke identifies two kinds of baptisms: the baptism of John and the baptism of Jesus. What is the difference? The baptism of John is a baptism of repentance. This baptism enabled a person to speak honestly of what they were doing wrong in life and offered a clear resolution to correct that bad behavior. But John knows that this is not enough; it is a good start, but this baptism will not give a person salvation. Anyone who has tried to overcome an addiction or bad habit knows this as well. We cannot live by our will alone, we need God.

So why did Jesus present himself for the baptism of John? After all, he did not need to repent of anything. Some insights from the Fathers of the Church can help us appreciate what was going on with John and Jesus in the Jordan River. St. Justin Martyr from the 2nd century notes that "just as Jesus had no need to be born, to suffer, or die—he did so in order to reveal himself to humanity, the baptism by John was an epiphany, a manifestation that Jesus is the Messiah. When Jesus first came to the waters of the Jordan 'he was looked upon as a carpenter' by all who knew him, but the proclamation of the Father and the descent of the Holy Spirit showed that he was much more than a mere worker of wood."

From the perspective of salvation history St. Gregory of Nyssa notes that "just as Joshua entered the Promised Land by crossing the Jordan River, Jesus opened the way to heaven by entering and dividing the same waters of the Jordan River." God is fulfilling his covenant.

The baptism that Jesus offers us is an entry into grace and community, an entry into a relationship with God who is all powerful, God who restores us to life and offers us salvation. All too often we try to live our lives by John's baptism alone, by our own will. We identify what is wrong in life, but we remain powerless to actually change what is wrong. John the Baptist reminds us that there is no salvation through human will-power alone. We need grace, a life and power beyond our own will. The baptism of Jesus offers us a power beyond ourselves and the gift of community found in the most Holy Trinity.

So often the biggest problems we have in life come up because we do not claim or accept who we are as children of God. We live in the shadows of sin and doubt trying to fill the hole in the soul with stuff or with behavior or other people's opinions that we think will give meaning to our life.

Finding and claiming our identity as sons and daughters of God in the waters of baptism and strengthening our awareness of this identity through prayer and the sacraments enables us to cut thorough all the confusing and competing voices that come at us in life. Through the baptism of Jesus,

* we have the strength to overcome our destructive choices and behavior;

* we have the courage and fortitude to embrace the cross that comes our way and remain faithful;

* we experience the mercy and unconditional love of God and we are impelled to share that same mercy and forgiveness and love with one another.

On this beautiful Solemnity of the Baptism of the Lord hear God say, "You are my beloved son/daughter, live in me as I live in you."
