BR. MATT SCHAEFER'S PEN

In today's Gospel passage from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus gives us three commands-turn the other cheek, love your enemy, and be perfect—that seems to be unfair, challenging, and impossible. The first two can be quite confusing because they seem to go against our basic sense of fairness and decency. I have a lot of good memories of my eight years in Catholic school. There was a lot of fun and fellowship in those "They'll Know We Are Christians" 1970's. A few bad memories I have involved a bully I'll call Eddie. He attended our school for about four years, during which time he wreaked havoc on dozens of students. It was difficult to figure why he lashed out at other boys-fights erupted without any provocation or warning. Eddie was even worse around girls. All of them were scared of him and it is no exaggeration to say he terrorized a few of them. Eddie never bothered me; for some reason he thought we were friends. I felt bad for the kids that Eddie bullied, but I always felt sorry for Eddie, too. He had no friends and from what I could see his family life was terrible. However, no one was turning the other cheek for Eddie; most kids fought back, not in order to harm him, but to protect themselves. And as for loving their common enemy, Eddie was impossible to like, much less to love.

I've never been persecuted or oppressed and I've never had an enemy. I've been treated badly by a few people at specific times in my life, but I didn't hate these people or anyone else. I suspect very few people actually harbor hateful feelings. So, is Jesus' message only meant for those people? I think it speaks to all of us. Most of us may not have any enemies attacking us, but what about those people who have hurt us, or those who annoy us, or those with whom we disagree. Do we judge and denigrate them, if only in our minds. Jesus is not saying we should have the exact same affectionate love for our enemies (or for every other human being on earth) that we have for our family and friends. The issue is that when we put the people whom we love in a higher position than everyone else, where does that leave the rest? No person, no group, no nationality, no religion should be second class in our minds. Whenever I'm tempted to judge someone, I try to imagine what God thinks of that person. Would God focus only on that person's mistakes, misdeeds, or sins? Does God see certain people as having less value and dignity than others? Like the late-coming workers in the vineyard, these people deserve just as much as anyone else-indeed, maybe even more mercy and understanding.

Eddie's attacks on others were bad, but what made it even worse was that he did this in the midst of so much good. He disrupted the friendly, Christian atmosphere of our school. And when we react in vengeful, hurtful, or violent ways to the wrongs that we suffer, we are disrupting the Reign of God that Jesus calls us to build. Did God approve of Eddie's actions? Absolutely not. Did God have compassion, understanding, and love for Eddie? Absolutely yes! This is the perfection that Jesus calls us to. Not unfailing moral perfection, but striving to orient our thoughts, actions, and lives toward being as loving as God is. Some years ago, the phrase "What Would Jesus Do?" became a bit of a fad. In light of the Sermon on the Mount, a good motto for all of us might be, "How Does God Love?" If we were to practice this kind of love, it might become a habit, and then a way of life. And wouldn't that be the perfect gift to show our gratitude to the perfect Creator.
