PASTOR'S PEN

The headline for this week's edition of *Our Sunday Visitor* announces, "Holy Week at Home." This will be a very different Holy Week for all of us. In listening to parishioners wrestle with the impact that the COVID-19 pandemic is having on every aspect of life, there is a range of emotions like fear, anger, weariness, skepticism, a deep longing for peace and an emptiness in not being able to receive Jesus in the Eucharist. All of these emotions are also found in the scriptural journey of Holy Week. But, we know this is not the end of the story. Jesus is risen and with us! Since we know the rest of the story, we must lean on the theological virtues of faith, hope and love to lead us through this time of darkness. Remember, "You can't have Easter without Good Friday."

Jesus came to us in humility, simplicity and vulnerability. "Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he himself, taking the form of a slave...he humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death." (*Philippians 2:6-8*) The gift of Holy Week teaches us that there is strength in humility, simplicity and vulnerability. Jesus died on the cross to reveal God's power in the world. The power he reveals is not muscle power or physical force. No, Jesus broke the cycle of violence. His life wasn't taken; he freely gave us his life as a gift. The power he reveals is rooted in love, a power that inspires us to bend a knee before the cross of Christ. Jesus teaches us, "When you are weak you are strong."

During this holiest of weeks, we are given a powerful opportunity to reflect upon God's love and the life we share in Christ through the waters of baptism. I do not see this time as an imposition on religious freedom as some have said. Having Holy Week at home is one way for us to work together for the health and safety of our community. Jesus himself went into the desert for 40 days and 40 nights which meant he did not go to the Temple or to the Synagogue as was his practice. The desert experience, the time of abstinence, fasting and being tempted, strengthened his trust in the Father. His love for God the Father intensified while he was in isolation, feeling the weight of his humanity.

I believe God has permitted this time of suffering so that we might learn something, just as He permitted sinful humanity to crucify His Son. What can we learn about ourselves and about God in this time of abstinence, fasting and being tempted? I believe God is leading us to new life. Will we remain faithful in this time of exile? This can be a time of great spiritual renewal if we open our hearts to God's will. Follow the example of Jesus and be the face of love by sacrificing yourself through a life rooted in simplicity, humility and vulnerability. Trust in God who always has the last word and that word is life!

Good Friday Fast and Abstinence

April 10th is a day of abstinence from meat and also a day of fast. The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The law of abstinence binds all Catholics ages 14 years and older. (Canons 97 & 1252)

Homily by Deacon Rusty Baldwin

"Who is This?"

When Jesus made his triumphant entry into Jerusalem, people laid palms on the road before him. He entered the city to shouts of, "Hosanna to the Son of David" and "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord." The whole city was shaken and everyone in the city asked, "Who is this?". This is a question that is asked in every age and one that all must answer, for Our Lord's very presence shakes us to our core just as it shook Jerusalem to its foundations. His presence compels us to answer the question personally and definitively. Many have proposed an answer to this question.

The crowds of Jerusalem, for instance, proclaimed Jesus a prophet, but soon thereafter called for him to be crucified. Judas wanted Our Lord to be a political revolutionary and betrayed Him when he could not convince him to be one. The apostles abandoned him in fear when he refused to turn aside from His Passion; when he continued down his road to Calvary. The scribes, Pharisees, and Chief Priests saw him as a threat to their power and prestige and so they wanted to kill him. Pilate and Herod, for their part, just wanted to prevent a riot. And so, when Our Lord would not be who people wanted him to be; when Jesus would not conform to their notion of who he should be, they abandoned him, betrayed him, or killed him.

If we are honest, at times we are tempted to try to make Our Lord into who we want Him to be too, aren't we? Isn't that what we do every time we sin; every time we refuse to love? Sometimes we want a Messiah who hasn't called us to holiness, who hasn't commanded us to love those who hate us, who hasn't told us we must be prepared to suffer as he did. We try to manipulate God, to get Him to think like we do. But when we see God as He is, He will not be who we imagined Him to be. And how could we expect it to be otherwise, unless God is made in our image rather than we in His?

God does not hide who He is. In the Garden of Eden, Adam and Eve were the one's hiding from God, not the other way around. Our Lord's Passion happened in the sight of all, but only certain souls recognized him for who he was.

Who were they? Those the world held to be of no account; those willing to share in his suffering. Those who loved him so much that they accompanied Him on His way of the Cross. The Blessed Virgin Mary, Mary Magdalen, Veronica, the women of Jerusalem, and John the Apostle. Those who in their humility, did not give into the fear of the moment, but let their love overwhelm their fear.

"Who is this?" He is the One who not only walks with us in our suffering, but shares in our suffering. He is the One who, though sinless, took our sins upon himself that we might live. He is the One who's deepest desire is that we love him and each other as he loves us. He is Our Lord; Our Beloved.

"Who is this?" He is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. The way to the Father. He is the one who is with us in the dark valley; he is the one who is at our side, leading us out of our present darkness of sickness, anxiety, fear, and most importantly leading us out of the valley of death which is sin; He is the one who shows us the way to our heavenly home where we will consummate our eternal love affair with Him.

The only possible answer to the question "Who is this?"; the only answer someone who truly encounters Our Lord and accepts him for who He is can give, was the same one given by the Roman Centurion and his men at the foot of the Cross; the very men who crucified Our Lord. This is the Son of God!
