PASTOR'S PEN

Last week we heard the Parable of the farmer who went out sowing seeds. Some seed fell on the path and the birds ate it. Some seed landed on rocks, sprouted, and soon withered. Some landed among thorns which choked the seedlings. And some seed landed on fertile soil and produced an abundant harvest. These are images of how God's Word is received into the lives of the people of this world.

Today's Gospel puts us back into the field. This time we find out that even though the farmer planted good wheat seed an enemy came and planted weeds that look like wheat. Now that their roots have grown together the owner of the farm decides that it is best to wait and separate the wheat from the weeds at the harvest time.

Our world is like this field. We experience both good and bad in life. Though we might want to escape this reality and live in a safe isolated bubble, it is not possible to escape the reality of sin and evil. Our world is not perfect and this side of heaven we will continually encounter the presence of both good and evil. We know this from the life of Jesus. You can be very good, you can be the Son of God and still get nailed to a cross.

Our call is to live in the world, but not of the world. Following the example of Jesus, we are to be a light and a leaven in the world that reflects the mercy and justice and compassion of God. Jesus didn't isolate himself from the brokenness and sinfulness of people; rather, He reached out to the Scribes and Pharisees as well as the tax collectors, prostitutes and unclean lepers. He treated them as His brothers and sisters, all children of the same Father.

Think for a moment: Why didn't Jesus weed Judas out of his core group of disciples? After all, he knew that Judas was going to betray him. Jesus lived in the hope that Judas would have a change of heart.

Why didn't Jesus weed Peter out of the twelve? Peter swore that he would never deny Jesus and yet he did...not once, not twice, but three times! Jesus didn't weed Peter out because he knew that Peter was not an evil person, he was weak. Yes, Jesus sees the weeds within us, but he also sees the wheat, the potential for goodness that was placed into our heart at the very moment of conception.

When we take a good honest look into our lives we can see that each of us is a blending of a saint and a sinner. God sees the potential for goodness within all of his creation; even though we betray him and deny him, God will never give up on us.

So how do we recognize the weeds in our life and avoid nurturing them? Chances are the weeds in life are anything that does not require any effort or commitment or inconvenience on our part. They show up so easily and try to take over. Maybe the weed in your life is a lack of patience where it is so easy to react rather than respond appropriately to a problem. Maybe the weed is a judgmental or sarcastic attitude that fails to see we are all children of God. Maybe the weed shows itself in the attitude, "If it feels good, do it," denying the harm this can bring to us. We must not allow the weeds to take over our lives and so we must stay close to Jesus and all he has taught us. He will help us rise above the weeds in life so that we can bear an abundant harvest.

In many hidden and silent ways God is constantly reaching out to us, helping us in our battle against evil. Like that bit of yeast placed within three measures of flour, God is abundantly blessing us with the gifts of the Holy Spirit. As we receive blessings from God we are called to be a blessing to others no matter what the challenges and difficulties in life might be. Our responsibility is to be "wheat" mingling our lives with the life of Jesus so that nurturing the Kingdom of God in our hearts we will be authentic witnesses of the Kingdom of God as the Church, the living Body of Christ, in the world today.

Tender Topics 3: Teaching Kids About Bullies

The story of David and the giant Goliath is among the greatest stories in the Bible. The story is important for both children and adults to learn because its meaning grows richer and deeper as we grow older. Each time the story is heard we gain new insights into what it means to be fully human- to face our fears and to grow up into the man or woman that God intends us to be.

Goliath controls the army of Israel, not by his weapons (which are huge), nor by his size (over 7 feet tall). Goliath wins through fear and intimidation of his smaller foes. He casts doubt into their hearts and creates fear wherever he goes. Evil takes over their faith and they lose sight of God's goodness and their own strength.

Kids need to know that evil does not stand a chance against goodness. God and human friendship will help us to face our giants and to remember that, in the good fight, we are never alone.

- Read or tell the story of David and Goliath together.
- Talk about a time when you faced your own "giant." What were your thoughts, feelings and fears? What was the outcome?
- Ask about what scares your kids and discuss three positive ways they can deal with their fears.
- Pray together, as a family, for safety and courage to face our fears


