### **PASTOR'S PEN**

Growing up in Wapakoneta, one of the summer activities available for kids to play was baseball. Following the example of my older brothers I decided I wanted to give it a try. One of the first lessons that we learned from the coach was "keep your eye on the ball." Keeping an eight-year old focused and attentive out in right field was not easy. As my eyes strayed to see a squirrel run up a tree or butterfly work through a patch of clover the coach would yell, "Angelo, keep your eye on the ball!"

I believe this was something that Peter needed to learn as a young disciple. He had been following Jesus and heard many teachings like the sermon on the mount, the Lord's prayer, the importance of depending on God who cares for the birds of the air and the need to watch out for false prophets. As the twelve were sent out on mission, Jesus told them not to take a lot of things, to have courage under persecution and to learn from the parables about the kingdom of God. These were all ways that Jesus was preparing Peter and the disciples to keep their eyes on Him. There would be challenges and distractions and so it was essential to keep focused on God.

In today's gospel these teachings would be put to the test. After the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fish, Jesus sent the disciples out on the open water. Between 3 & 6:00 AM, the darkest time of the night, a storm was tossing the boat around in the choppy water. Jesus comes walking on the water toward them. Tired, waterlogged and frightened the disciples cry out and Jesus quickly reassures them, "Do not be afraid." Peter says, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." Peter gets out of the boat and walks toward Jesus. Here is the key, Peter keeps his eye on Jesus and he remains safe as he moves toward Jesus. Then Peter gets distracted, feels the wind and the waves, and takes his eyes off Jesus and begins to sink. How often aren't we like Peter. We're ready to come toward Jesus but the storms of life cause us to get that sinking feeling and we cry out in fear.

One huge storm that all of us are experiencing is the covid-19 pandemic. The year 2020 was to be a year of clarity, 2020 vision, and yet there is so much uncertainly, confusion and darkness as a result of the pandemic that we are like the disciples in the boat on stormy waters. Jesus has not left us to weather the storm ourselves, he joins us in the midst of the storm.

Fear, anger, and despair are powerful emotions that can easily create that sinking feeling in our minds and hearts. The experiences of the quarantine, the resurgence of cases, the uncertainty of a vaccine, the desire to get things back to normal are all waves crashing against our lifeboat. Jesus says, "Do not be afraid." I am with you in the midst of the storm with the power to save you.

We see a similar picture in our first reading as Elijah is running for his life. He spoke out against Queen Jezebel, the wife of King Ahaz, bringing to light her corrupt and immoral practices. She wants to kill Elijah. He goes to the mountain of God and seeks shelter in a cave. Elijah cries out to God for help, but God is not in the strong wind, nor the earthquake or the fire...all symbols of power and strength. No, the Lord is revealed in the tiny whispering sound, the sound of silence.

Just as Jesus went up the mountain by himself to pray so too we must make time for silence. St. John of the Cross says, "What is most necessary for our advancement is to silence our appetites and our tongue. The language God understands is the silence of love." The peace that we seek in the midst of any storm can only be found in Christ Jesus. We must learn to always keep our eyes on him and not the storm and drama that goes on around us. Jesus reassures us today "Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid."

TENDER TOPICS - Talking to your child about Covid-19 Fear, anxiety, and uncertainty are all part of a new and unknown disease. Children may have a difficult time trying to make sense of it all. Endless news cycles may feel overwhelming, confusing and scary to a child.

The following are a few tips that may be helpful as you help your child understand Covid-19 and how it is affecting our world.

- Model Calmness: What you do and how you react to the situation will communicate much more to your child than words of reassurance.
- Maintain a Normal Schedule: Try keeping to routines and schedules with times for work, play, good nourishment and rest, as much as possible.
- Listen Actively: Acknowledge your child's feelings, fears and questions. Let them know that it is common to feel this way and their feelings are part of what makes us human.
- Know the Facts: Help your child get facts and good information from reliable sources.
- Practice Relaxation Strategies: Some of these strategies include being mindful of your breathing, eating and walking, as well as telling stories and drawing or painting pictures of people who are there to help us.
- Look for the Good: Good people and good things are happening. Don't forget to express thanks to and for them.
