

Seeing things from the "other" side

Have you ever found yourself, after hearing a Gospel story or parable, leaning more towards agreeing with the "wrong" side? For instance, the story about Jesus and his disciples at the house of Martha and Mary is a good example. Martha is quite busy getting everything ready, preparing the meal for Jesus and all his disciples, basically doing all the work while Mary sits at Our Lord's feet not helping at all. Martha complains to Jesus and (to oversimplify it somewhat) Jesus takes Mary's side. Whenever I read that Gospel, I imagine couples leaning towards one another and saying something under their breath. Something like, "I still think Mary should have helped Martha."

Today's parable is another case in point. It's hard not to be sympathetic to those who worked all day long and got the same pay as all the others. But let me share a key principle for interpreting the Bible. Whenever what we think differs from what we read in the Bible, or in Church teaching for that matter, that is like a huge neon sign with a flashing arrow that reads, "Divine wisdom hidden below, dig here!!" That being the case, let's do some digging!

To begin with we need to recognize it is a mistake to think the principal focus of Scripture is temporal or earthly. Scripture, at its core, is focused on the eternal and spiritual; it's trying to tell us something about heaven; telling us the story of how to get to heaven, really. In this parable we will not reach this eternal and spiritual message if we look for it from the laborers' perspective. After all, the message Our Lord is trying to get across is NOT, "Laborers need to unionize and start negotiating a collective bargaining agreement."

Now the parable starts out by saying that the Kingdom of Heaven is like a landowner. Clearly the landowner represents God, so let's take a look at the parable from the "other side," that is, from his perspective. And the first thing we notice about the landowner is what he does most throughout the parable. For nearly all the time he is seeking. He is taking the initiative, he is seeking people out. All day long he is seeking. The landowner always finds workers standing around even though there's plenty of work to be done. And the parable seems to imply that the laborers aren't all that interested in taking the initiative – they are idle, let somebody hire me, I'm not going to look for work.

This situation is depicted magnificently in a famous painting by Michelangelo, the renowned artist of the Renaissance. In his painting called, "The Creation of Adam," which he painted on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel in Rome, God is depicted as straining with all his might, his arm stretched to the fullest to reach out and touch Adam. For his part, Adam's arm is leisurely resting on his knee and he is barely lifting a finger to reach God.

Another interesting aspect about the parable is that the landowner specifically started paying the workers in reverse order of when they were hired, starting with the last and ending with the first. And he paid all of them the same wage out of a generous love for them and perhaps as a lesson or even a test. You see, God, that is the landowner, is generous to all; and he always operates out of love. Rain falls on the good and the bad alike. And had the hearts of the laborers been loving as well, they would have rejoiced at their fellow laborers good fortune and likewise been satisfied with their daily wage, that is their daily bread. God was trying to show them what generosity looks like. That is a particularly timely message for our culture isn't it, where we think God himself, if we acknowledge him at all, somehow owes us something and we are doing him a favor by being willing to work at all. If there is one thing we lack as a culture it is gratitude. What we have no lack of is envy and grasping.

To be a Christian is to be a disciple - a learner - always seeking to see things from God's perspective; to be more like the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; ever seeking to advance in the ways of love.
