PASTOR PEN

This time of year, people can be seen packing up the patio furniture and getting the snow-blower ready for the first snowfall. When you hit the starter for the first time after being idol so long, the engine sputters and kicks from lack of use. Sticky parts and clogged valves mess up the engine's performance. It's like the old saying, "use it or lose it."

A person's physical and spiritual life can also go bad if we don't stay healthy and in tune with our faith. God blesses us with wonderful gifts and talents. Are we creative and industrious in using them or do we bury them out of fear or laziness or pride? In today's parable, each person received the number of talents equal to their ability. In scripture, a talent is a measure of weight worth about 6000 denarii with one denarii being equal to one day's wage. It would take an average worker 3-5 years to earn one talent! As you can see, the master put great trust in each of the servants expecting them to make the best of this opportunity by investing in the future.

Two of the men in the parable, like the wise woman in our first reading used their gifts and talents freely and openly, taking a risk. Stepping out in faith means you take a risk to do the right thing, knowing God's love and mercy abounds. What would have happened if Abraham and Sara had stayed home and didn't venture into the new land? What would have happened if Moses had just let the Israelites stay as slaves in Egypt? What would have happened if Mary had said no to the Angel Gabriel?

Each of us is called to use the gifts, talents, resources, and opportunities given to us by God to build a better future. It is true, not all of us have been given the same abilities and opportunities. What matters is that you use your gifts to the fullest. Whether you fill a pitcher or a glass to the brim they are both full, it's just that they hold a different amount and by being full they are both fulfilling their purpose.

There is something tragic about the man who allowed his life to be ruled by fear, hiding his master's money in the ground. The risk of failure was too great for him and so he made excuses as to why he buried the money blaming the owner for being too demanding. Often when we fail to do something or miss an opportunity we too come up with some excuse to absolve ourselves.

Someone once said, "The person who really wants to do something finds a way; the one who doesn't finds an excuse." Maybe you are at a stage in life where you feel you've done your fair share and the thought of getting involved has you standing along the sidelines of life. Maybe the coronavirus has you second guessing everything. Maybe you are afraid of disappointment or failure and this paralyzes you from action. Maybe your priorities are out of balance and you are torn by the challenge of getting everything done. What rules your life—fear or faith?

Like the virtuous wife in our reading from the Book of Proverbs or the two industrious servants in the gospel, we are asked to use our gifts and talents freely and openly. A few years ago, our bishops summed up the call to stewardship in this way: "We are to receive God's gifts gratefully, to cultivate God's gifts responsibly, to share God's gifts lovingly with others and to return God's gifts—with increase—to God."

The mission of our Church is to foster a community of love that works to continue the mission of Jesus. Each of us has been given riches beyond measure! This week be aware of the many gifts and blessings that you have received from God. These blessings of time, talent and treasure are meant to be used to build the Kingdom of God on earth. Do not let fear keep you from being creative and sharing generously from your heart. God loves us deeply and unconditionally and that's how we must love one another. When we give of ourselves we do not lose anything; instead, we gain eternity.

Congratulations QuickBot Team! The Homeschool Co-Op that meets weekly at Emmanuel Parish is proud to announce that seven of their students forming the QuickBot Team competed in the international Lego League virtual competition. Out of over 38,000 eligible teams from around the world, the QuickBots went through multiple levels of judging and were chosen as one of the twenty semi-finalists to compete virtually in the Global Innovation Award this past June. They competed with their innovative project, Polar Play, a solar-reflective, color-changing coating that prevents injuries. Initially the idea was to prevent injuries due to hot playground equipment, but Polar Play has the potential to be used on other outdoor surfaces. The QuickBots were selected as one of the top three teams and named a runner-up in this year's competition!

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
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
