PASTOR'S REFLECTION

There is a huge palace in Florence, Italy that has a small chapel right in the heart of the building. When you walk into the chapel you find yourself surrounded on all sides by a mural/a painting of the magi (traditionally know to us as the three kings) as they journey to Bethlehem following the star in the night sky. At first glance you notice something unique about this scene. The Kings are not dressed in the flowing robes of the East. Rather, they are dressed in white leotard tights and wearing heavily embroidered cloaks typical of 14th century nobility! Instead of camels, they are riding on richly decorated horses.

The artist who painted this scene was not trying to recreate an original picture of Bethlehem. He was trying to teach a lesson. The events of salvation are not simply something nice to remember from a historical perspective. Scripture is the living Word of God and God is speaking to us today through the events and stories of the past. If that artist were living today he may well have painted the Kings making their journey in a Lear Jet or driving a finely appointed Mercedes-Benz to Bethlehem. Every generation must journey to Bethlehem.

In the Middle East, the title Magi comes from the word "magician" and was often associated with astrologers. These men were thinkers and philosophers filled with an inquiring spirit. The Magi studied the skies and found meaning in the movement of the stars and their patterns. A new star in the sky signified the birth of a new king and so we can understand their excitement in seeing the new star. Yet, why would they have taken the risk to make this long journey to the royal city of Jerusalem? Maybe they had experienced a nagging hunger and thirst for something more in life.

When the Magi arrived at Bethlehem and entered the humble stable they must have been a bit confused and skeptical that they had found a king. No doubt they expected to find a child in a fine palace surrounded by servants and guards. Instead, they found a child in a manger surrounded by animals, shepherds and his mother and father. I can imagine that they thought to themselves, "Have we been on a wild goose chase?" Trusting what they had seen and heard the Magi fell to their knees and presented their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh giving the best they had to offer to the King of King. This gesture is a spiritual inspiration for us as well. Do I always seek to give my best to Jesus?

Another important twist in this story is the decision that was made by the Magi to go home by "another way." It's safe to say, the Magi were changed forever by this experience. When I think of this kind of change I recall my first visit to our Precious Blood Missions in Guatemala. One day we entered a village where all the homes were made out of cornstalks woven together and the people were living in extreme poverty. Our guide, Sr. Mary, must have seen the look of sadness and despair in my eyes and said, "Don't judge things at first site; yes, the people here suffer from a poverty of means, but there is no poverty of spirit." As I looked around I could see the brightly colored dresses and the presence of so many smiles upon their faces. When I left Guatemala, I was changed forever by what I had seen. The faith I witnessed in the people was rich and deep and I learned from their profound simplicity.

If we truly believe that we encounter God in the Eucharist, here at Mass, then "How can we go home the same way we came?" We can't help but be changed by what we have experienced. Maybe my encounter with God today challenges me to change my behavior and the way I treat others. Maybe this means finding a better balance in my life so I'm not stressed or wandering aimlessly in life. Maybe this means I leave Mass worrying less and trusting God more.

The Feast of the Epiphany offers us an opportunity to be enlightened by God, to be open and ready to encounter God as the true desire of our heart. Today, let's run with the shepherds, and kneel with Kings

in adoration before our God who is with us today. From our hearts we sing: "O Come, Let us adore Him, O come let us adore Him, O Come let us adore him, Christ the Lord."

Epiphany House Blessing for the lintel of your front door (or front porch step). Trace these symbols,

20 + C + M + B + 21 while saying: The three Wise Men, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar followed the star of God's Son who became human two thousand and twenty-one years ago. May Christ bless our home and remain with us throughout the new year. Amen.

Then offer the following prayer: *Visit, O blessed Lord, this* home with the gladness of your presence. Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of your love; and grant that we may manifest your love to each other and to all whose lives we touch. May we grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of you; guide, comfort, and strengthen us in peace, O Jesus Christ, now and forever. Amen

"Chalking the door" is a way to celebrate and literally mark the occasion of the Epiphany and God's blessing of our lives and home. With time the chalk will fade. As it does we let the meaning of the symbols written sink into the depths of our heart and be manifest in our words and actions the Latin words, *Christus Mansionem Benedictat*, "May Christ bless the house."
