FR. MATT'S REFLECTION

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of Lord and with our celebration today we draw our Christmas Season to a close. Today the statues in our nativity scene go back into storage, along with the trees, the lights and various other Christmas decorations, they all go back into storage until next year. While the Christmas Season is formally coming to its close, I would like to think that the work of Christmas is only just beginning.

When I was ordained a priest, I celebrated my first Mass of Thanksgiving the day after my ordination, and then I celebrated a couple Masses of thanksgiving in a couple of different places. And there was a social gathering that followed. I enjoyed each celebration and each celebration was special, celebrating with various groups of people that have walked with me as I journeyed to the priesthood. It was special and overwhelming to walk into rooms and have people clap. At the end of it all I was tired of having people clap when I walked into a room and I was ready to begin the work of my first assignment. I was ready to put the celebration aside and ready to dive into beginning my priestly ministry.

Today we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord and Jesus's baptism was not an end but a beginning. It is after Jesus's baptism that we read in the gospels that Jesus begins his public ministry, begins to proclaim the Kingdom of God; he drives out demons, and heals people. The same is true for us. When we were baptized it was not the end of our relationship with God but in reality it marked the beginning of that relationship.

I once heard it said that after the ceremony of baptism, after the water has been poured, after we have been dried off, after the baptismal garment has been put on and then taken off and put into storage, and the candle a has been lit, extinguished, put back into its box, and put into storage, that the work of baptism has only just begun. Baptism is a once in a lifetime event, and it is often celebrated with a party. It is a celebration that really is about a beginning and not an end. It is about a way of life, it is about living as a child of God for the rest of ones life.

In our scriptures today we hear that when Jesus was baptized the heaven opened, the spirit descended like a dove upon him, and a voice came from the heavens saying "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased" (Mark 1:11). Many of us were baptized when we were infants and we don't remember the event of our baptism. While we may not remember the event of our baptism, I like to think that when each one of us was baptized, heaven was opened and the spirit descended upon us and a voice said to each us "You are my beloved Son, you are my beloved daughter, you are my beloved child, with you I am well pleased". While we may not remember our baptism and the Lord saying to us that we are God's beloved child and that our God is pleased with us, I think we need to be reminded from time to time that we are a beloved child of God. As we hear our God speak these words to Jesus today, may we also hear these words spoken to us as well 'you are my beloved child with you I am well pleased'.
