### **PASTOR'S REFLECTION**

This Wednesday we begin the season of Lent sometimes referred to as the Church's annual retreat. In this season we are given an opportunity to look into the mirror of our soul and ask, "Is this the person I am called to be?" This year to guide our reflection our pastoral region is planning a special retreat, **March 7-10**, entitled **"Together Through Lament to Hope"**.

When we encounter sorrow and pain or things don't turn out the way we want, our Christian faith teaches us not to fight back but to open ourselves to a prayer of lament. When we lament we are open to speaking honestly with God about our sorrow and the struggles we experience in life. Because of God's covenant of love we know that God will never abandon us and so we live each day trusting in God and living in hope.

With so many obstacles hitting us in this past year or so, our faith tradition offers us a path to peace in the midst of the challenges in life. We've experienced tornados, the mass shooting in the Oregon District, the Covid-19 pandemic and deep political divides as a people and a nation. What do we do with all this pain? Our faith teaches us to turn to God, to bring our complaint, to ask boldly for help and to trust that God who created heaven and the earth is with us. This is the path of lament which leads to hope.

Fr. Bill Nordenbrock, CPPS will be our guide as we will learn how to offer our prayer of lament and to walk a path that will lead us to Easter joy! During the first night of the mission, we will focus on justice recognizing that the world in which we live is not as it ought to be and this draws us into our prayer of lament. The second night we will focus on God's loving mercy as we recognize the truth that "we" are not as we ought to be and stand in need of God's mercy. The third night we will reflect on the truth that is found in our relationship with God and one another by sharing our personal hopes. The final night we will celebrate the Eucharist with a focus on the gift of peace that only Christ can give.

We will live-stream the Lenten mission for those who cannot make it to church. Participation in this year's Lenten Mission will help all of us grow in our appreciation of Christ's sacrificial love for us and how this mystery leads us to life.

No doubt, all of us are quite familiar with the term "social distancing." In this experience we have been given a tiny glimpse into the world of the leper we heard about in today's gospel. In the time of Jesus, any skin ailment was considered dangerous because it was seen as contagious and so, as we heard in our first reading, anyone who was thought to have leprosy was told to "dwell apart, making his abode outside the camp." Those thought to be infected were isolated, quarantined and forced to stay away from everyone.

In the time of Jesus, to be excluded from the community was basically a death sentence. The diseased person could not receive help from their family or the community. They had to keep their distance from everyone and no doubt, they felt far from God as well.

So, it was a big deal that Jesus reached out his hand and touched the leper. In doing this Jesus made himself ritually unclean. Jewish law required a person who became ritually unclean by touching a leper to enter a period of purification before returning to the synagogue. Some scripture scholars think this is why Jesus remained "outside in deserted place" after he touched the leper. He was following the purity laws. But, as we heard, this didn't keep people from seeking him out for healing.

Jesus reveals the compassionate heart of God as he reaches out to the sick and outcast restoring their dignity as children of God. Today Jesus is asking us to reach out to one another, lending a helping hand for someone who feels lost, alone, isolated, ignored or abandoned. Who are the contemporary lepers pushed to the edges of family, neighborhood or society today? We are called to continue the work

of Jesus by reaching out to those among us who are considered "unclean," the person we avoid talking to, the family member we ignore, the person we shun because of race, creed or cultural practices, the person afflicted with an addiction, the needy among us. In doing so, we are continuing the work of Jesus in our world today.

Lenten Reminders-Fast and Abstinence. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, April 2, are days of abstinence from meat and also days of fast, that is, limited to a single full meal. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. The law of abstinence binds all Catholics 14 years and older. The law of fasting binds all Catholics from their 18th birthday until their 59th birthday (canons 97, 1252).

Lenten Pilgrimage: St Francis Xavier, 611 Sycamore St., Cincinnati, Hamilton County - 1819, www.stxchurch.org The oldest parish in the Archdiocese was established on the outskirts of Cincinnati due to an unwritten prohibition against building Catholic churches in Cincinnati. The original 30'x55', wooden building was built by seven Catholic families at Liberty and Vine Streets and later moved to the present location. In 1840 the church became a Jesuit college and seminary. The location became a church again in 1861 and was placed under the patronage of St. Francis Xavier. The structure was restored after a fire in 1882. The parish today is recognized as the oldest parish in the Archdiocese, and a Registered national landmark. "RADIATE CHRIST". Twelve of the reflections for this annual event are taken from the Archbishops Pastoral Letter of 2020 on the 200th Anniversary of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. In this letter the Archbishop said, "This is my hope: that each of us, within our unique and personal circumstances and situations, becomes a more joyful witness of the goodness of a life lived in relationship with Jesus Christ."

# The Journey of Lent



## Ash Wednesday 2021 The Beginning of our Annual 40 Day Lenten Retreat

As the health implications caused by Covid-19 continue to bring about changes to daily life, these changes are also reflected in the life of the Church. This year the Vatican has asked priests to take special precautions when distributing ashes on Ash Wednesday, including sprinkling ashes on the top of people's heads rather than using them to make a cross on people's foreheads.

While observing the existing guidance already in place relative to worship in a time of public health concern, the blessing and distribution of ashes to the faithful on Ash Wednesday takes place in the following way (per instruction from the Holy See on Jan 12, 2021):

The Priest says the prayer for blessing the ashes. He sprinkles the ashes with holy water, without saying anything. Then he addresses all those present and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: "Repent, and believe in the Gospel", or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

The practice we are accustomed to would be to repeat the words "Repent and believe in the Gospel" or "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" to each person as the ashes are rubbed onto their forehead in the shape of a cross. The sprinkling ashes on the top of people's heads, rather than marking foreheads with ashes, has been the normal practice at the Vatican, in Italy, Poland and many other countries.

- Ashes are an ancient symbol of penance predating Christianity. They remind us of our mortality. We come from dust and unto dust we shall return.
- Among the ancient Hebrews and other Orientals ashes were a customary token of mourning and humiliation and were usually put on the head. The penitent or afflicted were sometimes known to sit or wallow in ashes. When used figuratively ashes signified frailty, insignificance, and worthlessness.
- From about the 5th Century, sinners confessed their sins on Ash Wednesday. They did not receive absolution but were enrolled in the 'order of penitents,' signified by the placing of ashes. They were assigned public penance to be performed throughout Lent and Holy Thursday morning they received absolution. In 1099 Pope Urban II officially adopted the name Ash Wednesday for this, the first day of Lent.

**Jonah 3:6** "When the news reached the king of Nineveh, he rose from his throne, laid aside his robe, covered himself with sackcloth, and sat in the ashes."

**Esther 4:1** "When Mordecai and the Jews learned all that was happening, he tore his garments, put on sackcloth and ashes, and walked through the city, crying out loudly and bitterly." **Job 2:8** "And he took a potsherd to scrape himself, as he sat among the ashes.
