DEACON RUSTY'S REFLECTION

Signs of the covenant.

In 1972, a Canadian rock band named "The 5 Man Electric Band" wrote a song called "Signs." It's a secular song but there is a line in the chorus that goes, "Sign, sign, everywhere a sign." And that one line describes today's readings perfectly because in them we can find signs everywhere!

But these signs are not like the signs we may first think of, like street signs, billboards, or signs on buildings or businesses. The kind we hardly notice until we are lost or don't know which way to go that is. Then we search for them pretty diligently don't we?

No, the signs in the readings today are the historical events, the people, the miracles, and even the numbers in the readings that point us to something beyond themselves, for that is what signs do don't they? Like the first rainbow in the clouds that Noah saw; as beautiful as it was, it also pointed to a larger even more significant reality; namely, to the covenant God made with Noah never to destroy all mortal beings by water again. And every time we see it, we are reminded of that covenant. You see, the signs God gives are meant to be a constant reminder of the eternal significance of events in history as well as the eternal significance of events in our lives.

The signs in today's readings point to God's redemptive activity in two areas; namely, our purification and preparation. The second reading, for instance, very clearly states that the flood is a sign of our baptism. And what else is baptism than a purification from sin? In fact, anytime you read about water in the Bible, it is almost always a sign of purification. Pharaoh's army being destroyed by the waters of the Red Sea after the Israelites passed through on dry ground is a historical event that serves as a sign pointing to something of eternal significance: sin being destroyed by baptism.

Numbers in the Bible are signs too. The number forty figures prominently in the Bible as a sign of both purification and preparation. The rain fell for 40 days and forty nights during the flood, thereby purifying the earth of sin. The Israelites wandered for forty years in the desert until they were purified of the desire to return to Egypt. This historical event serves as a sign pointing to our need to be purified of concupiscence. That is, our desire to return to sin though we have been freed from it by baptism. This clearly has eternal significance! In the Gospel today Our Lord spent forty days in the desert, in preparation for beginning his public ministry. Oh, by the way, how many days are there in Lent? Right, forty!

So following the lead of the readings today, we should consider Lent as a time significant for its own sake, but also a time with eternal significance. It is a time of purification which we can accomplish by "going out into the desert," as it were. Where by the traditional Lenten penitential practices of fasting and denying ourselves we strengthen our ability to resist the desires of the flesh. But it is also a time of preparation through prayer and almsgiving, through our beautiful Lenten devotions and good works. But this begs the question, what are we preparing for? The joy of Easter Resurrection, certainly. But just as Our Lord spent 40 days in the wilderness preparing to begin His public ministry, so too are we called to prepare for our ministry.

We too are signs for our family, our neighbors, our culture, and the world. We are not signs like what they might first think of, like street signs, billboards, or signs on buildings or businesses. But the truth is, our world is lost and doesn't know which way to go and is searching pretty diligently for a sign, don't you think?

You see, our lives are not our own. We are not here for our own sake, but rather we are here so that our lives might point to, might signify something bigger than themselves. Like the bow in the clouds that points to the covenant God made with Noah for all to see, our lives too are a covenant of love with God for all to see. We are

here as a sign to everyone that their lives have eternal significance and that the covenant of love God made with us through Our Lord Jesus Christ is a covenant he wants to make with them as well.

We are signs of the covenant!

Lenten Pilgrimage: A Journey Through the Archdiocese Adams County 1950, Holy Trinity Church, 612 E. Mulberry St., West Union, OH 45693, www.holytrinity-ac.org. The first pastor was Fr. William H. Bishop. The Catholic community in Adams County dates to 1878. In 1928 the Glenmary missionaries celebrated Mass in Manchester, in 1949 moved to Mt. Union where Mass was celebrated in the rectory and on May 31, 1953 Holy Trinity Church was dedicated. An interesting fact, Holy Trinity Church in Dayton contributed to the building of the church in West Union. In 2000 the Glenmary priests transferred the Adams county parishes to the Archdiocese of Cincinnati.

Auglaize County, 1832, St. Augustine Church, 8 North Hanover St., Minister, OH 45865, www.staugie.com. Fr. Johann F. Rese, Vicar General of Cincinnati celebrated the first Mass in the county in 1832. St Augustine with 200 primarily German families became the mother parish in 1836. A French missionary Fr. Louis Navarron, who had oversight of west central Ohio, encouraged Bishop Purcell that German speaking priests were needed. In 1845 the Missionaries of the Precious Blood under the leadership of Fr. Franz S. Brunner led the parish. The present church was dedicated in 1849.


