

DEACON RUSTY'S REFLECTION

The first reading from Job began in a rather interesting way don't you think? "The Lord addressed Job <u>out of the storm</u>...," That seems kind of an odd place for the Lord to be doesn't it? But turning to the Gospel we find something similar. Our Lord is fast asleep in a boat as the Apostles did all in their power to keep it afloat in the midst of a terrible storm. Now, at first Our Lord choosing this time for slumber might seem, at the very least, a bit odd, especially given the dire situation. But it becomes interesting and even somewhat amusing when we consider that in the first reading God spoke to Job out of the storm! So perhaps, just like someone who lives near train tracks hardly notices train whistles or the sound of trains going by, if you are God who is used to being in the midst of storms, why would being in yet another prevent you from getting a little shut-eye?

In any case, let's carefully review the sequence of events from the Gospel: (1) In the midst of the storm the disciples woke Jesus up, (2) Our Lord told the sea, "Quiet! Be still!", then (3) There was great calm. It was at this time, Jesus asked the disciples, "Why ARE YOU terrified?" Not why WERE YOU terrified, that is, during the storm, but why ARE YOU *still* terrified now? You see, the focus of the disciple's terror had moved from the storm, to the power of Our Lord to quiet the storm! They didn't understand that power and that terrified them. And that is what Our Lord revealed to the disciples as the key to understanding, the key to "fearing not"; whether we are in the midst of the storm or witnessing the mighty power of God. He asked the disciples, "Do you not yet have faith?" Faith, then, is the key.

The fact is, neither human reason, human intellect, nor science, nor the scientific method exhaust the sources of truth. For faith reveals to us realities and truths not discoverable by science. Realities like truth itself, beauty, and goodness. Truths like wisdom, justice, honor, and love. These are not material realities and therefore cannot be measured by scientific instruments nor described by mind-numbing statistics. Even more important than that, faith leads us to the source of all truth. Faith enables us to go beyond discovering something – beyond understanding an abstract truth, however profound, however sublime – to an encounter with someone – a real, living, and substantial person – Truth Himself; and this without fear. For this person, the very image of His Father, Our Lord Jesus Christ, is also love.

All this has particular significance for fathers on this Father's Day. For it serves to remind us that our role in the family goes well beyond providing for their material needs. Indeed, the responsibility fathers are entrusted with is a sacred one. Our culture is unleashing storms on our children and the family itself the likes of which we couldn't even have imagined when we were growing up. And our kids will be looking to us to lead them – they will be looking for men of God. And in the midst of these storms our children need to see us going to Jesus as the disciples did. But not in fear, but rather with great confidence; with the kind of faith and love that drives out all fear.

That is why our Catholic faith is the most precious gift we can give our children. And while we may not see the fruit of our labors right away, God will honor our efforts to be a witness to our children, He will honor the example we set for them, whatever age they may be and at whatever age we start doing so.

But we can't simply be men who know something *about* God, we need to be men *of* God. They need to see in us men who no longer live for themselves. They need to see that we love Our Lord Jesus Christ, that we have an intimate and personal relationship with Him, that we are men of prayer who daily spend time with Him. Men who pray with them and show them how to live out their faith.

Celebrating the Bicentennial of the Archdiocese!

The first Catholic diocese west of the Allegheny Mountains was established in 1808 in Bardstown, Kentucky. Its frontier territory was enormous. Thirteen years later, on June 19, 1821, Pope Pius VII decided to divide the Bardstown Diocese to better serve the growing population of Catholic settlers, immigrants and Native Americans. The newly-created Diocese of Cincinnati, the eighth Catholic diocese established in the United States, originally encompassed Ohio, Michigan and parts of Wisconsin.

Today the Archdiocese of Cincinnati radiates Christ to almost half a million Catholics living in 19 counties of Western and South-Western Ohio. Through its families, parishes, schools hospitals, social service agencies and other ministries, the Archdiocese of Cincinnati proclaims the goodness, beauty and truth of the Catholic Faith.

Our three parishes in Downtown Dayton help tell the story of the history of the Archdiocese. Emmanuel parish was founded in 1837 as the first Catholic parish in Dayton and was German speaking. St. Joseph Church was founded in 1847 as the first English speaking parish in Dayton. Holy Trinity Church was founded in 1861 and the original church still stands as the oldest Catholic Church building in Dayton.

As we celebrate this bicentennial year and prepare for the future, please keep the intention of the Archdiocese in your prayers as we enter the Beacons of Light pastoral planning process.
