DEACON RUSTY'S REFLECTION

The feeding of the 5,000; and many more!

Today, it is clear that the people fed by Our Lord immediately recognized Him as a prophet like the prophets of old. In fact, they knew He was a prophet greater than one of the greatest of the prophets, Elisha. For whereas Elisha provided bread for 100 from 5 barley loaves with some left over, Our Lord fed 5,000 men, not counting women and children, from 5 barley loaves and two fish; with 12 tall wicker baskets left over! But that's not all. In the Gospel, Jesus provided them clues that led them to recognize him as someone even greater than Elisha.

How do we know that? We know that due to one word in the Gospel. A single word, but the one that makes all the difference. In the Gospel we read: the people saw the sign and said, "This is truly THE Prophet, the one who is to come..." Not just A prophet, THE prophet; one that had been with them before and that they knew would come again. Like Our Lord is the New Adam, like Our Lady is the New Eve, the Jews were expecting a "new" prophet from of old to come again, THE prophet. But who? Let's see if we can piece together the clues from the Gospel reading and what Our Lord did and figure out who this is. What man from the Old Testament is associated with the Passover, performed miraculous signs, went up a mountain, taught the people, miraculously provided bread to them, and was prophesied to come again? If you were a Jew during the time of Jesus, you would have no problem solving this riddle. Who was THE prophet? Moses! Now, Christians don't usually think of Moses as a prophet but all the Jews did. That is why the people recognized Jesus as the New Moses. For Moses was not only a prophet, he was the first of the Old Testament prophets and the archetype of all the prophets to come!

Now, you might be thinking, where is this prophesy in the Bible and why haven't I heard about it before? I can't speak to the second question, but the answer to the first is, it is clearly in Scripture, in the book of Deuteronomy chapter 18, verse 15 – a prophesy from Moses himself. It reads: "A prophet like me will the LORD, your God, raise up for you from among your own kindred; that is the one to whom you shall listen." Now, most Jews including the Scribes and Pharisees, were not expecting a political Messiah who would free the Jews from the oppression of the Romans, though a very vocal minority were, including two of the Apostles, Simon the Zealot, and very likely Judas Iscariot. It seems a good number of the 5,000 were among these too for as the Gospel said, they wanted to make Jesus king. Most Jews, however, in line with the Jewish traditions and teaching based on Deuteronomy 18:15 were expecting a spiritual Messiah, a New Moses who would free the people from spiritual bondage and lead them across the desert to the heavenly Promised Land and the New Jerusalem. You can see now why the Scribes and Pharisees were confused with Jesus – this New Moses – who often seemed to disregard the Law. In fact, Our Lord was showing them, as he said many times, that He was the fulfillment, perfection, and completion of the Law. The Scribes and Pharisees simply failed to recognize him or, more often, refused to accept him.

But given the gift of faith we have all received, we can recognize this New Moses, the one who was to come, in Our Lord, He who makes all things new. It is He who is leading us through the desert of this life to the heavenly Promised Land. To sustain us on the way, at the Last Supper, the New Passover Sacrifice of the Lamb, he has given us New Manna from heaven, the Eucharist in which we receive his Body and Blood. And through the Blessed Sacrament and all the other Sacraments, we may, like Our Lady who is full of grace, receive grace without limit.

Sometimes we think we are so inadequate, our lives so inconsequential, that whatever we do can't really make a difference. But that isn't true. For in addition to Our Lord being the New Moses, the Gospel also assures us that when we, like the young boy in the Gospel, set our offering before the Lord, he will receive it and give thanks.

And when we offer our lives, our very selves and all we do, to the Lord: humble, inadequate, and broken as we are, with all our joys, sorrows, hopes, and fears, Our Lord will miraculously transform our offering, however small it may be, into a superabundance of grace and love that we are, in turn, to share with others. So that nothing will be wasted.


