FR. ANGELO'S REFLECTION

Last week's gospel reading ended with Jesus saying, "Hear me, all of you, and understand." The Pharisees and some scribes had come down from Jerusalem and were looking for a reason to condemn Jesus and his teachings. Jesus invites them to listen to his new teaching about what is clean and unclean, but they refuse to listen. Reflecting on this encounter I'm reminded of an old proverb from Matthew Henry, "There are none so deaf as those that will not hear."

Today we are bombarded by so many competing voices that we can become deaf to the voice of the Holy Spirit. Everyone has an opinion to offer that may or may not be well informed, truthful or in line with the foundations of our faith. Coming to church, reading scripture, prayer, reflecting on the teachings of the church all help us to hear more clearly the path to salvation that is found in God.

In response to the Pharisee's disbelief and their refusal to listen to Jesus, Jesus turns to the pagan region of Tyre and Sidon and there he heals the deaf man. The image we are given in today's gospel is very earthy and graphic. In a sense Jesus connects himself to the deaf man by sticking his fingers into the man's ears and then taking spit He puts it on his tongue. It's as if Jesus is plugging himself into the man like jump-starting a dead car battery, transferring His healing Spirit into the man, allowing the grace of God to awaken the man's ability to hear. Jesus shows that those who want to hear, will hear.

In healing the deaf man with a speech impediment Jesus uses the word "Ephphatha" which means: "Be opened!" The memory of this saving act is recalled in the Baptismal ritual of a child when the priest or deacon touches the child's mouth and ears saying: "May the Lord Jesus, who made the deaf to hear and the mute to speak, grant that you may soon receive his word with your ears and profess the faith with your lips, to the glory and praise of God the Father."

It seems to me that we can all use a renewed outpouring of the Ephphatha prayer in our lives so that we no longer turn a deaf ear to God. Today, hear Jesus speak to you the word "Ephphatha"—be opened. Ask Jesus to plug Himself into your heart and fill you with His Truth. Reflecting upon this image Fr. George Smiga suggests that we ponder two questions. First, "How am I deaf or mute to the presence of God in my life?" Secondly, "How am I too distracted to hear the beautiful sounds of creation or too busy to listen to what the Word of God is saying to me in my day-to-day life?"

We are reminded today of the difference between listening and hearing. Hearing is the physical act of picking up sound. When we listen we allow ourselves to be affected by what we hear, and this changes our thoughts, words and actions. By allowing ourselves to be touched by the living Word of God we cannot help but be "exceedingly astonished" like those who witnessed the healing miracle of Jesus.

All too often we are deaf to God's voice because we're so busy, distracted, weary or fearful. If you seek peace in your life then it really matters what you are listening for. Today hear Jesus say to you, "Be strong, fear not! I am your God who comes to save you." Ask Jesus to connect His heart to your heart and to fill you with His wisdom and truth.

Everyday God blesses us with things and experiences that have the potential of astonishing us. An awesome sunset, the birth of a child, a deep peace in the midst of sorrow, open heart surgery, a flight soring to 32,000 feet, a safe place to live, strawberries in January or a child's story of heaven. Have you ceased being astonished? Do you only listen for what's wrong with people and the circumstances of our world? We can all use a renewed outpouring of the Ephphatha prayer in our lives so that we no longer turn a deaf ear to God and in turn use our gift of speech to be the Good News of God's astonishing love.
