FR. ANGELO'S REFLECTION

Every year we begin the month of November with two wonderful celebrations, the feast of All Saints and the feast of All Souls. Here in Ohio these feasts fall within the season of Autumn. The growth of summer is past and now creation enters into a period of rest as we bring in the harvest, the fruits of our labor. There is a sense of completion and accomplishment that comes to us this time of year. Autumn reminds us that all things are passing and that even in passing there is beauty because we know we are going home.

Our prayer this week offered in memory of our loved ones how have died is a very ancient practice. Some of the earliest writings concerning our belief in the resurrection of the dead go back to the year 180 BC in the Old Testament book of Second Maccabees. It was seen as a worthy practice for believers to offer prayers and sacrifice for those who have died that they might be freed from any sin. "Judas Maccabee took up a collection among all the soldiers which was sent to Jerusalem to provide for an explatory sacrifice. In doing this he acted in a very excellent and noble way, inasmuch as he had the resurrection of the dead in view; for if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again, it would have been useless and foolish to pray for them in death." (2 Maccabees 12:43)

The Catechism of the Catholic Church explains, "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." (ccc 1030) This is called Purgatory. It is not a state of punishment but a purification, a cleansing similar to our Baptism. In the experience of purgatory, we meet God face to face and recognize the lost opportunities we had to live in love. God gives us another chance to accept his mercy and love. Our prayers for our loved ones who have died assists their journey to complete purification and unity with God.

As we remember the dead our thoughts soon turn to our own journey in life. "Am I ready for death?" It is a sobering question and yet one we must all be ready to answer. Through the waters of Baptism all the baptized are "set apart" as a people freed from Original Sin and anointed with the oil of Chrism, living temples of the Holy Spirit. This is how we become adopted children of God. Just as we have been "set apart" by God, so too, God has placed a call, a vocation in our hearts so that the living Word of God will continue to be heard in our words and actions. Living the call to holiness means that we claim our identity as children of God and act in such a way that others see Jesus in what we say and do.

What is unique about the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob is that God desires to be in a relationship of love with His people. Looking back in time, we know that the Greek pagans didn't love their gods, neither did the Romans. Yes, they feared their gods and they served them, but they did not love their gods. The Good News about the one true God that we believe in is that He is a God who can be loved, a God who IS LOVE and who desires our love.

When Jesus comes to take us home, I suspect He will ask, "(Insert your name), have you loved God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength and have you loved your neighbor as yourself? When we stop and think about it, the message of the bible is all about relationships; the relationship between God and each of us, and our relationship with one another. These relationships are rooted in and held together by love. If we say we believe in Jesus, then the first duty we have is to reflect the truth of God's commandment of love in our day to day lives.

The US Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) is urging Americans to contact their senators to oppose Senate Bill 1975, the so-called Women's Health Protection Act. The Senate is expected to vote on it soon. Archbishop Joseph Naumann, Chairman of the Committee on Pro-Life Activities, called this bill "the most extreme pro-abortion bill our nation has ever seen."
