FR. ANGELO'S REFLECTION

Happy New Year! Today the Church begins a new liturgical year with the First Sunday of Advent. Our guide throughout this year will be St. Luke as we reflect upon the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. In our gospel reading we begin with the end of the story as Jesus announces that the Son of Man will come in glory. Just as our ancestors in faith awaited the coming Messiah, we must be alert and awake as we wait for the second coming of Christ.

Growing up I always associated waiting with powerlessness. "Oh, be patient and wait, the bus will be here soon." "Quit fidgeting and wait your turn." Waiting seemed like a waste of time. Only more recently have I come to see that waiting is not about being powerless. Active waiting is all about keeping our eyes and ears and heart open to what is coming next. Active waiting lets the voice of God penetrate the walls of control we set up wanting things our way and in our time.

Our readings today highlight a people waiting. In the first reading Jeremiah speaks a word of hope for those who are waiting for the Messiah to come and in the Gospel, the followers of Jesus hear the call to wait for the second coming of Christ in his glory. This is not a pipe dream, but a promise made to us. In our waiting we nurture the seed of faith given to us in baptism, lifting up what has already begun in us, life in Christ that we share today, a life that is eternal.

The call for this first Sunday in Advent is not a call for fear, but a call for faith. We can be certain that there will always be challenges and bad things happening in this world, but do not despair. God will never abandon us. We can trust in his promise that no matter what happens, he will give us a peace that surpasses understanding—if we trust in Him.

Here in the Northern Hemisphere, the season of Advent takes place during the darkest days of the year when there is the least amount of sunlight. Advent stands in the midst of darkness as a season of hope because we believe that the light of Christ can break through any darkness.

Our work is to be about the transformation of the world one person at a time, one experience at a time. As we begin our Advent journey it is important to identify where darkness has a hold of my life. Then ask, "Is there something I can do to radiate the light of Christ in the midst of a cold, dark and hardened world?" Is there a simple act of kindness that I can do to warm the heart of another person?



In this Advent season can I see my waiting as a gift calling me to slow down and to re-order my priorities? Can I say I'm sorry or forgive someone who has hurt me in order to thaw a relationship that has grown stone cold? Advent reminds us that we must always be vigilant and ready to stand before the Son of Man.

I recall a story about Robby Robins, an Air Force pilot during the first Iraq war. After his 300th mission, he was surprised to receive permission to pull his crew together and to immediately fly his plane home. These soldiers flew across the ocean to Massachusetts and then drove all night to Western Pennsylvania. Upon arriving home Robby saw a big banner across the garage, Welcome Home Dad! Robby thought to himself, "How did they know?" He had not told anyone he was coming home. As he walked into the house the kids, half dressed for school screamed, "Daddy!" His wife Susan came running down the hall, she looked terrific, her hair fixed, make-up on, beautifully dressed. "How did you know?" Robby asked. "I didn't" she said through her tears of joy. "We knew you'd try to surprise us, so we've been ready every day for you to come home." This is the attitude we must have not only in Advent but every day as we watch and wait on tiptoe for the coming day of the Lord. Be on watch, for the day of the Lord is near!

Pray for Dobbs Tuesday, November 30th. On Tuesday, the 7:00 PM Miraculous Medal Novena at Emmanuel Church will be dedicated for the intention of the Dobbs case. In the United States, abortion has taken the lives of over 60 million unborn children since 1973 and kills well over 600,000 each year. The United States is an extreme outlier in abortion law and policy, being one of only four countries - along with China, North Korea and Canada – that value human life so little that abortion of a child is permissible at any stage of a woman's pregnancy. The upcoming Supreme Court case of Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health could start to change that, as the court considers the question of whether it is constitutional to ban abortion at any point pre-viability. Oral arguments begin on Wednesday, Dec. 1. You are encouraged to participate in Mass, a holy hour, pray the rosary or offer other prayers around December 1st for this intention and to pray regularly in the coming months until the case is decided next summer.
