FR. ANGLEO'S REFLECTION

Today, when a question comes up in a conversation that can't be answered, many people will do a google search to find the answer. On the internet we look for information about a product, a news story, directions to a house, recipes for dinner, books to buy or answers to trivia related questions. In many ways we, like the Magi, are seekers.

God has placed within our hearts a desire to be with Him for all eternity. And so, we search for that light of Truth to guide our hearts and to lead us safely home. Like the Magi we must listen with both the head and the heart to probe the curious ways of God's providence.

What are you seeking today? In a Peanuts comic strip, Lucy once grumbled to Charlie Brown about how awful the New Year has been. She complained about all her problems and finally said, "I don't think this is a New Year at all—I think we've been stuck with a USED year!" Is your New Year feeling like a used year? If so, God is inviting us to see life with fresh eyes, the eyes of faith, and to renew our belief that with God all things are possible.

In today's gospel we see that the Magi are seeking the newborn king of the Jews. What's amazing is that the Magi were not Jewish. They were Gentiles coming from the East, probably Persia, trained in philosophy, science, medicine, and astrology. Even though they did not follow the Jewish tradition they knew about the coming of the Messiah and began a dangerous journey to find this newborn king.

On the other hand, the Jewish leaders should have been attentive to the signs pointing the way to a new-born king. Only after Herod asked them for information did they come across a passage in the Book of Micah about a small, insignificant town called Bethlehem which was to be the place where the shepherd of Israel, the Messiah, would be found.

The mystery of Christmas reminds us that God comes to us in the most unexpected ways reminding us that in the pursuit of truth we need one another, not just those with whom we agree, but those outside our circle of fellowship who can help us to see with new eyes. A regular theme in the gospels is that the Jews needed the Gentiles to awaken them to the Truth and the Gentiles need the Jews to show them the path to the Truth they were seeking.

God who created the heavens and the earth has placed a longing in our hearts to be with Him for all eternity. In our pursuit of this treasure, we can easily lose our way choosing power or control, selfish interests and desires, personal security, material wants or the status quo to maintain the world we have made.

In this Christmas season we are invited to ponder the gift we have been given in Jesus, the Word made flesh. He is God's gift to us. In preparing to meet the newborn king the Magi chose gifts that reflected their belief in the person they would meet. The gift of gold symbolized his kingly humanity, the gift of frankincense reflected his divinity, and the gift of myrrh was a foreshadowing of his redemptive death. Their gifts reveal the story of the child and connects him with their journey of faith.

What is the gift that you want to give to the Christ child today that reflects your relationship with God and your love for God? Maybe your gift to Jesus is a commitment to put God first in your life. Maybe your gift is a commitment to get rid of a bad habit that leads you into darkness. How are your relationships? Do they feel old and tired or can you look upon them with a fresh perspective? Remember, God wants to give us a new year, not simply a used year.

As we begin this New Year we are asked to put aside anything that would keep us from saying yes to God's will for us. Like the Magi, our journey has not been easy and yet we are blessed to encounter Jesus Christ, not in Bethlehem, but in the gift of the Eucharist we share today.

Then offer the following prayer: Visit, O blessed Lord, this home with the gladness of your presence. Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of your love; and grant that we may manifest your love to each other and to all whose lives we touch. May we grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of you; guide, comfort, and strengthen us in peace, O Jesus Christ, now and forever. Amen

"Chalking the door" is a way to celebrate and literally mark the occasion of the Epiphany and God's blessing of our lives and home. With time the chalk will fade. As it does we let the meaning of the symbols written sink into the depths of our heart and be manifest in our words and actions the Latin words, Christus Mansionem Benedictat, "May Christ bless the house."
