DEACON RUSTY'S REFLECTION

Today, St. Joseph and Our Lady spend 3 days frantically looking for Jesus and finally find him in the Temple. What I find most interesting about this whole episode is how Mary and Joseph, both saints, and Our Lord, fully human and fully divine, really and truly did not understand each other. And while this is indeed odd, paradoxically, this can serve as no small source of consolation to us all; to all parents and children, saints-in-training if you will, who often experience the same thing!

Our modern culture too, has a similar problem when it comes to understanding the scriptures, in particular, the second reading today in which St. Paul discusses love, subordination, and obedience in the context of husbands, wives, and children. This particular passage has been the subject of more than a little confusion and controversy.

But this very controversy is why the finding of Jesus in the Temple is of more than passing interest. Because when we identify the source of confusion, then we will find the key for understanding God's plan for our families here on earth.

You see, the source of confusion between Jesus, Mary and Joseph, to state it directly, was that Mary and Joseph's question was earthly and temporal while Our Lord's answer was spiritual and eternal. That is, they were coming to each other from different perspectives. Mary and Joseph's question, "Why have you done this to us?" was rooted in the natural and completely understandable concerns of frantic parents who can't find a lost child – a terrifying experience and one that I can personally attest to! Our Lord's answer, "Did you not know I must be at my Father's house?" in contrast, was spiritual. That is, Jesus' answer was from the unchanging perspective of eternity.

Mary and Joseph, being the greatest of the saints, invariably had the same perspective as Our Lord, except, it seems, in this instance. The result? Confusion initially, but ultimately Our Lord's answer planted a seed. And that seed, that mystery if you will, ultimately yielded a rich harvest of wisdom and insight into the mind of God. Wisdom and insight Mary and Joseph saw with their own eyes when the Son of God went with them and was obedient to them — when the uncreated eternally begotten Word of God subordinated himself to Mary and Joseph, his own creation.

Now let's see whether we might turn this confusion over the 2nd reading into a source of wisdom by contrasting these same two perspectives; the earthly and temporal perspective with the spiritual and eternal one. What perspective does our culture bring to the family? It can be summed up in a single word: power. Who has the power and how can I get it and keep it? It doesn't take much reflection to see that this is the perspective our culture brings to anything and everything. Furthermore, our culture considers subordination offensive and obscene for the simple reason that if you are subordinate to anyone or anything, you give up that power and control. That St. Paul also said in his letter to the Ephesians that husbands and wives should be subordinate to each other does nothing to quell the indignation of those who only view authority in the family through the lens of power.

In contrast, the eternal and spiritual perspective Our Lord brings to the family can be summed up in a single word: love. A husband has indeed been placed in authority over the family, so too the wife, placed there by God. But this authentic, God-given authority, is only manifested when exercised with heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, when they bear with one another and forgive one another as they have been forgiven by the Lord. And when subordinated to love, their authority is sealed with the bond of perfection! A bond that binds and unites the family together! In love, the husband and wife become one flesh, subordinated to each other, and children are the supreme gift of that unity!

DEACON RUSTY'S REFLECTION Continued...

Do you know what the word subordinate actually means? It means to place under the order of. Our will, our sins, our faults, and shortcomings in the order of power can only hurt, divide, and destroy. But when placed under the order of love, when subordinated to love, it's different. You can almost hear Our Lord imploring husbands, wives, and children to do this. "I have given you all the graces you need – place your will, your hurts, your grievances, your anger, bitterness and frustration under the order of love – subordinate yourselves to love, become servants of love – that forgiveness, reconciliation, unity, peace and joy may be yours. The way to a Holy Family is simple: we must subordinate ourselves to love.




