#### FR. ANGELO'S REFLECTION

Today's gospel passage about Martha and Mary comes right after last Sunday's parable about the Good Samaritan and the importance of tending to the cry of someone in need. In today's gospel, Martha is upset, worried and anxious about taking care of the needs of her guests. Hospitality was a big deal in those days, travel was difficult and so providing food and shelter for a traveler was an essential part of their culture. We catch a glimpse of the importance of hospitality in the first reading from the Book of Genesis when Abraham stops everything to tend to the needs of the three strangers.

We all know from experience that there are a variety of personality types that make up the human race. Martha was the type of person who got things done. She was attentive to detail and wanted everything to be just right. On the other hand, Mary didn't see the need to rush around so that everything would be perfect. She was more interested in catching up on the news and enjoying Jesus' company.

My guess is that Martha wanted to make a good impression and do something special for Jesus. After all, he had been traveling quite a bit and could use a good home-cooked meal. Both Martha and Mary were seeking to be attentive to the needs of Jesus. One was focused on the physical needs of Jesus and the other focused on the emotional and spiritual needs.

But what was it that Jesus needed most at that time? Unlike last week's gospel reading of the Good Samaritan, feeding Jesus was not an emergency situation. Jesus was not starving, nor had he been attacked by robbers and left for dead. The nourishment that Jesus really wanted was the gift of friendship and a listening ear and this is what Mary intuitively understood and provided. Both Martha and Mary were trying to be attentive to the needs of Jesus, each in her own way.

Jesus is not challenging Martha because of her work ethic, he challenges her because she is worried and anxious about many things. Mary is not worried or anxious. She was listening to Jesus speak and that is her focus. What are the things you worry about, the things that distract you from your relationship with Jesus? They become distractions that rob us of peace. Jesus invites us to place our worries and fears into his hands trusting that he will provide for us in our need.

In the passage right after today's gospel reading, we see Jesus teaching his disciples to pray by giving them the Our Father prayer. Prayer and action go hand in hand. Prayer helps us to listen, to be in tune with God and to follow His Will rather than simply doing our will. Sometimes we can be compulsive, impulsive or controlling and we fail to use our time and resources wisely.

Prayer helps us to cleanse our hearts so that our motivations are appropriate to the need. At the same time, we have been given the responsibility to continue the mission of Jesus, to build the Kingdom of God here on earth. If we fail to sacrifice and work hard out of love for God and others, then our prayer will be hollow and just words. Prayer and action are different sides of the same coin in a balanced spiritual life.

Martha was worried and upset about things that could be left for later or maybe made less elaborate. My guess would be that a bowl of fruit and some fresh bread would have been fine for Jesus. At that given point in time we sense that the hunger in the heart of Jesus was the desire to share in a loving relationship. He wanted to spend the limited time he had during this stop on his way to Jerusalem to talk with his good friends and enjoy their company.

Mary has chosen the better part because she is seeking to listen to Jesus first which will help her to be more fruitful in her work. This week bring your worries and problems to Jesus in prayer, even if it's just for a little while, and listen to His heart. Rest in His gift of peace and His promise of unconditional love.
