### FR. ANGELO'S REFLECTION

One of the dominant themes in Luke's Gospel, is the proper use of money and our stewardship of all God's gifts. Luke does this because he was writing to a Greek, Gentile community that was too focused on getting ahead in life. They did not have the rich faith tradition of the Jewish people to guide their moral life. In his writings Luke does not condemn wealth but rather, he condemns the preoccupation or obsession to attain wealth rather than caring for the needs of others.

The struggle to be a good steward of God's gifts is a universal challenge, not just for the gentiles but for all of us. Dr. Rodney Wilmoth tells the parable of a person who was very rich, he could buy anything he wanted but he was miserable. So, the person decided to see a counselor. During the session, the counselor took the man over to the window and looking out at the street he asked, "What do you see?" The man replied, "I see men, women and children." The counselor then took the man and stood him in front of a mirror and asked, "Now what do you see?" The man said, "I see only myself." The counselor then said, "Both the window and the mirror have a glass pane. When you look through the glass of the window, you see others, but when you look into the glass of the mirror is a layer of silver. When silver is added, you cease to see others. You only see yourself."

Whenever our focus is on material things, we become self-centered and fail to see the world God intends us to see. This is the dynamic going on in our first reading from the Prophet Amos. Amos was challenging the people because they were cheating others by adjusting the weight and measurement scales that were being used in business. These people needed to change their ways because they were no longer acting as God's chosen people.

If you allow money or material things to be your focus in life, then you cannot fully give yourself to God. As Dr. Wilmoth says, "Money will buy a bed, but not sweet dreams. Money will buy books, but not wisdom. Money will buy a house, but not a home. Money will buy pleasure, but not joy. Money will buy a crucifix, but not a Savior."

In the gospel parable for today we encounter an employee who is caught squandering his boss's property. Quickly, he develops a scheme as a way of stabilizing his uncertain future. The master's praise in the parable is not an affirmation of the manager's wrongdoing, but an approval of the creative and practical plan of action the manager took to secure his future. Jesus is saying, we too need to be as creative, industrious, and responsive in our pursuit of eternal life. We do this by looking through the window of our heart and recognizing the dignity of each person as a child of God.

It's important to remember where we focus our attention in life because a threat to our spiritual life is also a threat to our overall wellbeing. The devil is very tricky and will slowly help us dismantle the moral fiber of our life if we are not alert. How easy it is to rationalize ourselves down the wrong path. "Oh, just one click on a pornographic website won't hurt." "Fudging a little on my insurance claim isn't that bad, after all, they have plenty of money." "I'm too tired to pray today, God will understand." Slowly, yet surely our intended course directed toward heaven shifts and we find ourselves lost in darkness.

Today, Jesus invites us to get back on track and to work at developing a strong spiritual and moral consciousness. We need not wait until the end of life to take an account of our stewardship of God's gifts. Each night we can examine our conscience and ask, "Did I spend more time today looking through the window or into the mirror? Did I respond to the needs of others or focus on my own wants and desires? One day Jesus will say to us, "It's time to give an account of your stewardship." How will you respond?

"My past, O Lord, to Your mercy; my present, to Your love; my future to Your providence." St. Padre Pio, Feast Day: September 23rd.
