DEACON RUSTY'S REFLECTION

There seems to be a principle in life that is true no matter who you are: we all need a purpose in life, we need a noble mission, a reason to get up in the morning. We all have a desire to make a difference. Because Jesus knew his mission, because the Lord is gracious and merciful, a despised tax collector abandoned his wickedness, believed, and became a devoted disciple with a mission. But if we don't have any goals or aspirations, if we have forgotten what our mission is, we become restless, unsettled, depressed, or just plain bored. Without goals, our life becomes monotonous, routine, or even a drudgery, and so we turn to diversions, distractions, or start fixating on non-essentials.

Our faith is governed by this principle every bit as much as other aspects of our lives. Therefore, if we don't understand what our mission is or where we fit into it, then it's really no wonder so many Catholics are not quite sure why Jesus gave us the sacraments or why they're important, why we believe what we believe, or why we worship the way we do. It's no wonder some don't really understand what is happening at Mass or why it's a sin to intentionally miss Mass. It's been my experience that if someone is going to complain about Mass, the vast majority will say one of two things: either "it's boring" or "I don't get anything out of it." Let's take those statements at face value. Let me speak to that via an analogy.

Imagine a member of a sports team training, practicing every day, rigorously following the training regime, eating, drinking, and living the game. He knows what his mission is: to win games and bring home the trophy. When he takes the field, he plays to win.

Now imagine another player, doing all the same things but never taking the field – never getting into the game. He's content to sit on the bench and simply watch the game. After a while though, he does decide to do something, he decides to complain...about the practice sessions being too long, about the healthy food on the training diet...it doesn't taste good – I'd rather have pizza he moans, the calisthenics, the drills...it's all so boring, he complains. I'll never use this stuff. I can get just as much exercise walking in the woods enjoying nature. Is it any wonder he's bored? He never uses what he is being taught, and as a result, any skills he had have wasted away. And not only that, he's a bit confused. He thinks he's on the team to get exercise!

He's forgotten that the goal of his team is not to suit up in the locker room, work out in the weight room, scrimmage out on the practice field, or listen to pep talks from the coach at half-time. The goal of his team, the reason he is on the team, is to win games. Those other things are critical to accomplishing the mission, but they are not the mission. The same thing holds true for us as Catholics. We have a mission. And that mission is two-fold: personal sanctity and evangelization. Our mission is to change our hearts to be like the heart of Jesus, our mission is out there, to share the good news. But what about the bishops and priests? Aren't they the holy evangelists of the Church? Holy certainly, but evangelists only secondarily. Now, without a doubt Fr. Angelo and Fr. Seraphine have both done a lot of evangelizing, but their primary role as caretakers of our souls is to equip, train, and sustain us so we can carry out our mission, so that we can become holy and evangelize the world.

And just where are the people who need to be evangelized, that need to know Our Lord and his love for them? Where are the people who wonder if anyone really cares about them; if there is anyone who really lives out the Gospel message they keep hearing about on social media, the Internet, TV, and the radio? Some of them might come to church, but most are out there, where you work, where you go to school, where you shop, out on the soccer fields and so on; places Father can't be at all the time, places only you have access to. And let's face it, for many of them, church is the furthest thing from their minds. We have to go to them.

The liturgy, the Mass, the Eucharist and all the other sacraments, devotions, and ministries of the Church are a critical, indispensable,

and irreplaceable part of our faith. They are God's loving gift to us that enable us to fulfill our mission as Catholics. Like all the drills, exercises, and practices sports teams go through to win a championship, the sacraments and devotions provide us the grace we need to achieve our goals of sanctity and evangelization, and it's only because of that grace that we have any hope of accomplishing our mission. But the sacraments and devotions of themselves do not accomplish the mission – we must do our part empowered by those graces.

If you find Mass boring, if you don't understand why we do all that we do, maybe you've forgotten what you're here for, what your mission really is. Maybe it's time for the holy ones of God to get out of the pew and into the game!
