FR. ANGELO'S REFLECTION

Today's first reading got me thinking about my first trip hiking in the Appalachian Mountains. As we went along the rocky trail you had to watch your footing and be prepared to adjust your step when an obstacle came your way. On one pass, had I not been watching, I would have stepped right on a snake that was sunning itself on the path. When we reached the summit and looked out over the deep valley and mountain range I just stood in awe of the beautiful sight. I could see why scripture looked upon a mountaintop as a dwelling place for God.

On this First Sunday of Advent the Prophet Isaiah invites us to "climb the mountain of the Lord" so that He can instruct us and guide us along the right path. We are invited to hold before our eyes the vision of a world where swords are turned into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks. In the time of Isaiah there was a lot of conflict and danger. The Assyrians had taken over the Northern Kingdom of Israel and the people of God were losing hope. Isaiah offered them and us a message of hope!

As we journey with the Lord in this Advent season, we do not need to add anything more to an already busy schedule. Like my hike along the Appalachian trail our call is to be watchful and attentive to the challenges that cross our path as well as an open eye for the hand of God at work in our lives. The season of Advent is not only preparing us to celebrate the gift of Christ's birth, but it is also a time for us to be prepare for the coming of Christ in glory.

During this Advent season we can "beat our swords into plowshares," we can throw off the works of darkness by:

- Getting rid of demeaning speech or harsh words of criticism from our conversations.
- Steering clear of violent video games, movies and shows.
- Praying and working for peace in our hearts, in our families and between the families of nations.
- Encouraging children and grandchildren to be peacemakers.
- Supporting individuals and groups offering outreach to the poor or lost.
- Learning how to listen deeply before we speak.

This is an important one as we enter into this hectic season. One of my favorite quotes from St. Philip Neri says, "It is in correct proportion that we are created with two ears and one mouth—we should listen twice as much as we speak.

The season of Advent reminds us of the things we already know and helps us to put them back into perspective. All too often we go through life like sleepwalkers, going through the motions but not really engaged in living our faith boldly. You know the days, the alarm rings, we get up, clean up, eat and we're on our way to work, or school, or family obligations, doing what needs to be done but not really present to what is going on around us. As St. Paul reminds us that each day "We are to put on the Lord Jesus Christ" allowing him to live in and through us.

We begin our new liturgical year with the season of Advent, walking once more with our ancestors in faith who longed and yearned for the coming Messiah. The beauty of Advent is found in its simplicity. We don't need to add anything more to an already busy schedule. It is a matter of watching and being attentive to the hand of God at work in our lives each day; that's what it means to prepare for the day of the Lord. Jesus did not come into the world in majesty and power, but as a tiny baby. He comes to us when we least expect—in the smile of a child, the healing touch of a nurse, the listening ear of a friend or spouse, in the stillness of the night, in his living Word and in his Body and Blood we share today.

Like our ancestors in faith, we are to keep watch and stay awake for the Kingdom of God is being revealed in our midst. Watch your step! You don't want to miss God's precious gift, which will come when you least expect, in the most common and ordinary ways of life.
